

t's been a wild ride since last August.

We weren't sure when or if there would be a high school football season at this point last year, but sure enough the UIL, each individual district and school were able to perform and execute a plan that got us through the year and allowed us to crown state champions.

The year did not disappoint for Katy ISD and District 19-6A. For the first time in 12 years, a new district champion was crowned in Tompkins and that team made a run in the playoffs into the Class 6A, Div. I regional semifinals.

Katy High bounced back from not winning district by steam-rolling through the Class 6A, Div. II playoffs and claiming the school's ninth state championship in football, tied for the second most in Texas high school football history and only trailing Aledo's 10.

Taylor also made a run to the regional semifinal after finishing third in district and Seven Lakes made its fifth ever playoff appearance.

But it's a new year with new faces and new goals.

Katy High will be determined to win another district championship and to win another state title as the Tigers return many key members to last years team, but Tompkins won't let that championship go without a fight. Though the Falcons lose some big names, there is strong depth in the team and they will do everything in their power to try to repeat.

There will be a fight for the district's playoff spots this year, with every team feeling they have what it takes to make it into the top four.

Taylor will have to find a way to keep the success it has

had the past two years going after losing a number of seniors and having big pieces to replace on the offensive line. But head coach Chad Simmons thinks his team will be up to the task.

Seven Lakes is still looking for its first-ever playoff victory and that is the driving force this season, even with the probability of being put in Class 6A, Div. I if the team makes the playoffs.

Mayde Creek is entering a new era under J Jensen, as he returns to his alma mater as head coach and tries to bring stability to the program. The Rams have talented players but will need to find depth and consistency in order to become a playoff contender.

Cinco Ranch seems like it is on the verge of a breakthrough. With Gavin Rutherford back at quarterback and returning experience at many positions, this could be the year the team breaks out and gets back to the playoffs.

Morton Ranch has questions to answer at quarterback this season but head coach Ron Counter likes both options that he has at the position. The Mavericks have finished just outside of the playoffs each of the past two years and with an experienced squad returning, should contend for a playoff spot this year, while Paetow won its first playoff game last year, but has bigger aspirations this season in what could be its last in Class 5A.

In Class 4A, Royal is trying to get back to the playoffs after a four-year drought and in private school coverage, St. John is looking for its next step in a rebuild.

I can't thank the community and coaches enough for how open and supportive they have been since I got here just over a month ago.

It's the most exciting time of the year, football season, and I can't wait to get started.

in district, win state.
It's a new year, but the expectations don't change for Katy High

and this year is no exception.

The Tigers didn't achieve their first goal last season but turned in a historic playoff run en route to the school's ninth state championship to achieve their second goal, beating

teams by an average of 41.6 points per game in the Class 6A, Div. II playoffs.

Now, the focus is on 2021, and reclaiming the District 19-6A title after not finishing first for the first time in 12 years.

TWO GOALS FOR

"We understood that we were beaten, but we weren't defeated last year," said Katy High head coach Gary Joseph. "Sometimes you worry too much about winning streaks and keeping that alive, when the focus just needs to be on winning ball games. They learned from it and moved on and they know that they have to prepare and be ready for each and every team they play in district. We respect all of them and you have to respect

the work they all put in as well, because once you do, you aren't going to do things halfway. So now we're going to go out and do what we can to try and win a district championship again this year."

The Tigers bring back 24 lettermen, including five offensive starters and six defensive starters and feel good about what they have up front on both offense and defense, despite having to replace some key players.

"The defensive line has done a good job of growing up," Joseph said. "We're going to be okay at those positions. We just have to get all of them ready."

Caleb Koger returns for his junior season after passing for 1,552 yards and 24 touchdowns as a sophomore as does Seth Davis, who rushed for 1,755 yards in his sophomore season. Katy has talent at the receiver position with Nic Anderson, an Oregon commit. Caleb Webb and Dylan Erickson will lead the offensive line, and Joseph has been especially impressed by Webb's leadership.

Defensively, linebacker and USC commit Ty Hana will again lead a unit that held opponents to under 12 points per game last year and Carson Marshall, who was elected a team captain, will help anchor the linebacking unit. Hamilton McMartin will be a leader in the secondary.

"They've done a really good job of using the summer to improve," Joseph said. "We do have a little bit of experience back, but there's some that are inexperienced and unsure of themselves. We have to get to the point where they have that confidence because I don't want them being unsure. You have to be able to play this game with a lot of confidence and be decisive. That's the biggest thing we have to work on."

Katy High will open the season Aug. 27 against Clear Springs at Legacy Stadium, with the team's first district game coming Sept. 23 against Seven Lakes.

Joseph is working to make sure the players are ready for that first district game and thinks the teams non district

schedule will get them prepared.

"There's really three different seasons within the one," Joseph said. "You have non district, district and then the playoffs. We have set up some games with some really tough non district teams and for me that allows us to create depth. Last year we had guys battle with COVID-19, then

we had injuries and we were able to overcome that because our kids had gotten enough reps where they understood what they were doing, and they got better because they got to play in a game. That's what non district is about is giving those guys opportunities and creating the depth for everything."



t's been a process for Chris Dudley since he took over as head football coach at Cinco Ranch two years ago.

The Cougars have won just one game over the past two years, a 21-17 win over Mayde Creek last year. However, with the return of 30 letterman and a strong senior class. Dudley feels like this is the year the team makes the next step.

"It's been a really good spring and summer," Dudley said. "The kids understand that we are taking them through this and you can't skip steps in that process. In spring football, we had a lot of things answered on both sides of the ball and that's the first time since I've been here that we were able to do spring football. That carried into the summer and kids have continued to grow and get better and hone their crafts. They see that all these things fit together, and they understand what we are doina."

The Cougars return six starters on offense and eight on defense, and Dudley expects to rely on his upperclassman to lead the way.

"It's really big to have that number of guys back," Dudley said "When you look across this district, everyone has guys coming back so it's good for us to be able to keep pace with that and have about what everyone else is bringing back. But it's big for us because for these kids, the moment's not going to be too bia for them."

Cinco Ranch had a competitive team last season, but just couldn't finish in close games.

The Cougars were in five one possession games, but lost four of them.

The next step for the team is to turn those close games

into wins, as they did against Mavde Creek.

"Our kids learned how to win last year in that Mayde Creek game, and it was huge for us to get that win," Dudley said. "It taught them that it's a four-quarter game. We made a number of big plays that made a difference in the second quarter, in the middle of the third quarter, and that's important as well. That and the four games we lost that were so close have been a lesson. The guys remember that, and they know they have to finish games off as well."

Fordham Parks will be a big piece in the secondary and will help quarterback the defense and get everyone lined up and will also be a punt and kick returner for the team, while Odera Nsobundu will help anchor the secondary. At linebacker, Kasey Murry returns to the team as a senior after having missed last season with a knee injury, and the team returns three starting defensive lineman.

Offensively, Gavin Rutherford will be under center for the second straight season after throwing for 1,372 yards and 11 touchdowns as a sophomore. Seth Salverino and Noah Abboud combined for over 1,000 yards receiving and eight touchdowns last season and will lead the wide receiving corps.

Cinco Ranch will open the season at College Park on Aug. 27 and will open district play against Tompkins on Sept. 23 at Rhodes Stadium.

"There's really a comfort level with the guys this year," Dudley said. "There's familiarity and knowledge with the schemes and that allows guys to play faster. The competitive nature of these guys is a joy to watch, and they're out to prove a lot of skeptics wrong. I just can't wait to get started."

on Counter finally feels comfortable heading into a season with who he has at quarterback.

Despite having two players competing for the position, Counter loves what he has seen from those candidates throughout the spring and summer.

"Both Josh Johnson and Mike Gerald have looked really good for us," Counter said. "We have what I think are two really good quarterbacks. They can both run and throw and they're both really smart. We are probably in the best shape we have ever been in my four years at Morton Ranch at the quarterback position."

Johnson, a junior, and Gerald, a sophomore who will also play some at receiver, have pushed each other throughout the spring and summer. With both practicing for the quarterback position, they've been able to help one another get better in that key role.

"They push each other but they also get along well," Counter said. "Both of them are willing to do different things. Gerald plays some receiver, and Josh was wanting to play receiver over the summer when we would use Gerald at quarterback in 7-on-7. They're just two great kids and it's great to see."

The Mavericks have finished fifth — one spot short of the playoffs each of the past two years. Morton Ranch lost two games on the final plays of games, something that Counter had never experienced before in his 33 years of coaching.

"That's the first time I've been on a staff where we lost two

games literally on the last play of the game," Counter said. "Those are heartbreaking, but I think the guys have learned from it and hopefully if we get into some close games this year, we can turn that into a win."

Cinco Ranch returns six starters on offense and five on defense. Giving the Mavericks experienced options on both sides of the ball.

"We feel really good about what we have on offense,"
Counter said. "With what we have at quarterback and our experience on the offensive line and at running back, we really feel like we could be special there.
On defense though we are a little thin. We're the school with the smallest enrollment at Katy ISD and we have some really good players — we just don't have a lot of depth."

Karsten Christopher, Jr. and Benen Lee have been selected as team captains and have stepped up into leadership roles as incoming seniors.

Zachary Sessions and Jakobe Hinton will be counted on within the offensive line to lead the way while Alexis Lima Kijuan Tavarez will help anchor the defense.

Ryan Hall and Dean Ford have impressed heading into their sophomore years and J. J. Arriaga brings consistency to the teams kicking game.

The Mavericks will open the season against Cy-Lakes on Aug. 28 and will face Katy Taylor in their district opener on Sept. 24.

"It's an exciting time and we're just ready to get going," Counter said. "We've been competing and been in the hunt for a playoff spot these past two years. Hopefully we can make that jump this year and find a way to get into that three of four spot."

The program has made the playoffs each of the past five seasons, and the past two years has made it to the state semifinals and regional semifinals. However, the team graduated a senior class of 38 in May that played a major role in those appearances.

Despite that, the Mustangs feel they have the talent to make another run and feels the extra experience his team has gained by being in those

playoff runs gives them an edge.

"I think that's one of the big keys as to why teams that make deep runs continue to do that even with people graduating," said Taylor head coach Chad Simmons. "There's a cycle when kids are playing more games. The kids at the lower levels get to continue to practice, they get to experience those games even if they aren't playing. It's just a cycle of giving you a better chance to be successful."

The Mustangs return four starters on both offense and defense, and Simmons feels comfortable with the depth on both sides of the ball.

"We had a really good senior class

and we have five Division I players and that's a hard thing to replace," Simmons said. "We don't really have those top end guvs: we maybe have one or two. We really top to bottom have more good high school players that can be successful. We just have to get those guys prepared and ready and we're young in spots. The big key is getting those guys who haven't played in as many varsity games prepared for the grind of district play."

Michael Whitaker, the team's leading rusher and receiver, will be the lead back this season, while Hollis Robinson is expected to lead the receiving corps. Hay Nolan will help anchor the offensive line.

Joe Jefferson moved from safety to guarterback over the offseason and Simmons said he has showed real promise. Jackson Ingram is also working at quarterback.

"We have a real good group of guys with good speed at our skill positions." Simmons said. "They can stretch the field and so that's a really big thing we want to do offensively is put pressure on defenses by stretching the field both horizontally and vertically and forcing teams to get out of their comfort zone against us."

Defensively, the team feels good about Robinson and Jaden Burr in the secondary, Ashton Coker on the defen-

sive line and Connor Vickery, Nick Goedde and Jayden Williams at linebacker.

The goal early in the season is to find a way to get better every time they step on the field, and learn in non-district play, which will start in the team's season opener against Cy-Springs.

"You always have some guys who haven't played a lot of varsity football, so it's huge to have that time to find out where they fit best," Simmons said. "Having those four games back before district is great and it helps prepare them."

Taylor will open district against Seven Lakes on Sept. 30.

"The key for being successful in any district is to have that consistency, and knowing that no matter which of the other six teams that we are playing, that every one of those games count to whether you get into the playoffs or not. You have to take every game seriously and know that they are all important when it comes to district games. You have to be ready week to week and prepare and adapt to opponents."

ompkins may be losing some marquee players this season, but the expectation of success hasn't changed in the program.

Head coach Todd McVey has built a program that expects to contend, as the Falcons have made the playoffs each of the past three years, reaching the regional round each season.

With an experienced squad returning, things are no different this year, and the team wants to repeat as District 19-6A champions.

"The determination is there every year; it's a new year and everyone wants that just as much," McVey said. "But our biggest thing is to take it one game at a time and make sure we get better. We're more interested in ourselves and seeing how we can improve

than we're interested with anyone else. We just have to focus on improving every day."

Tompkins returns eight starters offensively, but loses their starting backfield in Jalen Milroe, who is now at the University of Alabama, and Marquis Shoulders, who is now at the University of Tulsa.

McVey knows that it will be hard to replace what those two gave the team but hopes the returners can help along the younger players.

"The guys who were in the backfield were very talented, but we have some guys coming up who were on the varsity and were on the JV that have done good things," McVey said. "We look forward to seeing those guys grow into their own roles. It's going to be different and that's ok. 

even Lakes made it back to the playoffs for just the fifth time in school history last season, but the ultimate goal still eludes them.

"It allowed us to do things in the spring that are more advanced and even though we'll have nine new starters on defense, I think from game one you'll see that discipline and preparedness from them."

Offensively, Grayson Medford, who was the leading receiver on last year's team, will get the first shot at quarterback and has impressed Hamon so far with his ability to both run and throw. D.J. Nechvatal and Filbert Presley will lead the offensive line.

Hamon has liked what he's seen from Landon Ross at tight end who is moving up from JV last season. The team has three options at running back and Hamon feels comfortable with all of

"Medford is just a natural leader; he has a charisma about him," Hamon said. "Even when he played receiver, players just looked to him and so moving him to quarterback gives him that role even more. He's such a good athlete that we can't afford not to use his legs, his arm and his creative playmaking ability. We are going to have to find some targets for him, but our running backs and our tight end Landon Ross will do a good job taking some pressure off him."



hen J Jensen was hired as the head football coach of Mayde Creek, he knew that he had a special opportunity.

Although the Rams missed the playoffs last season and only won one game in District 19-6A, the team's best season in over two decades came the season before under now Jordan head coach Mike Rabe.

It was also a chance for Jensen to return home to the school where he graduated in 1998 and was an assistant coach at from 2005-2010.

"It's been great," Jensen said. "My biggest thing is instilling being a great teammate, being a leader in the community and doing exactly what's right for the Rams. From the time that we've got here to now, you can see that guys have grown. When we first got here, guys might yell after an incomplete pass - now they're picking the ball up and talking to the quarterback and trying to figure things out. We want to teach people how to be leaders and how to pick their teammates up."

For this year's senior class, it's the third head coach they've had in three years. But the team has bought in to Jensen's culture and has taken to the new offense and defense that have been installed.

"They've been doing a lot of learning and they've been focused and ready," Jensen said. "They're learning exactly what their job is on every play and just doing your job on that. not someone else's. Don't try to step outside the scheme, don't try to do too much. Let the scheme win on defense and offense and focus on what you should be doing. If all 11

people do that, then we will be in great shape."

The Rams lost 28 players to graduation this year and return 15 varsity players, but only three offensive starters and five defensive starters.

Still. Jensen has seen leadership from players trying to help people without varsity experience understand what it takes to be successful.

"Leadership is earned through sweat and the respect you demand on the field, and some guys have definitely earned that so far." Jensen said. "Our seniors have done a great job and so have our juniors. They really are pushing each other to get to that next level and holding their teammates accountable. If we make a mistake, they don't yell or put them down — they go and encourage the guy and help them fix it, which is exactly what you want."

Key players for the team include Jordan Kelly (WR, S), Tav'Shawn Wilson (CB. S). Emiliano Gonzalez (OL) and Leroy Turner (WR) as well as the team's edge rushers on defense, including Greg Meeks, Xavier Hansen and Kyle Johnson.

Mayde Creek will open its schedule at Cypress Lakes on Sept. 2 and will open district play against Cinco Ranch at Rhodes Stadium.

"The kids are doing better every day," Jensen said. "That's the key is to keep getting better and have that consistency. It's going to be great once we have that film to look at and show them so that we can continue to make improvements and show them how to pay attention to detail and focus on exactly what they have to do on every play. That's how you get better and how you'll be ready for district."



"The district is really deep," Gotte said "Manvel, Foster, Hightower - those are the names you always hear, but Terry had a decent year last year. Angleton is talented and well coached. So, there's really six teams that are really good football teams. We have to be at our best because if we aren't, we are going to get beat. We just have to stay focused on the process, working on what we need to work on every day and doing those things that will put us in position to be at our very best. If we do those things and stay focused, I think we are going to do pretty well."




