## Former Paetow football coach charged

**Lonnie Teagle accused of improper relationship with student, indecency with a child**

The Harris County District Attorney's office on Nov. 14 charged Lonnie Teagle, the former Paetow High School football coach, with indecency with a child and improper relationship with a student.

Teagle, 39, posted on Nov. 21 a

\$20,000 bond on the indecency with a child charge and a \$10,000 bond on the improper relationship with a student charge, court documents said.

The indecency with a child charge is a second-degree felony, with at least a two-year prison term if convicted. The improper relationship with a student charge is a second- or third-degree felony, depending on the circumstan-

ces, with at least a two-year prison term if convicted.

According to the charging documents, two Paetow students came forward with complaints against Teagle, claiming that he inappropriately touched them. School officials met with one of those students and her mother.

## New homes planned in northern Katy area

The northern Katy area will soon see a new housing development on the northwest corner of the Katy Hockley Cutoff Road-West Road intersection.

Colliers, a Houston-based commercial real estate firm, has purchased about 494 acres located on the corner of Katy Hockley Road and West Road in Houston, Texas.

Tim Sojka, broker of the See TIM Sell Team at Keller Williams and Katy Times real estate columnist, said development in the northern part of the 77493 zip code today resembles what the development in the southern part of the 77494 zip code looked like about 10 years ago.

"It's the new frontier for Katy," Sojka said.

In a statement, the buyer, Woodmere Development Co., Ltd., was represented by James Kadlick, Harrison Kane and Chris Hutcheson of Colliers Land Advisory Group.

"Houston's Northwest corridor has traditionally been one of the strongest growth areas for new development," Kadlick, Colliers senior vice president, said. "This trend isn't slowing down even with the changing economic environment. There are very few tracts left within Katy Independent School District and this is one of them."

Students living in the planned development would be attending Paetow High School, Haskett

## Four new Royal ISD trustees take office

Four new Royal ISD trustees took their oaths of office at a Nov. 21 school board meeting at the district's administration building in Pattison.

Jimmy Meader, Cori Hillsman Vahalik, Perla Mariela Aguilar and Scott Hartman were all first-time candidates for the four positions they won in the Nov. 8 general election.

Hartman, who is self-employed, defeated incumbent Adrian Rocha, a teacher and coach, and Mona Chavez Rios, a mail carrier, for the position 1 seat.

Aguilar, a business owner,

defeated Gary Crusetturner, an insurance agent, for the position 2 seat. Incumbent Cheri Fontenot did not seek re-election.

Vahalik, an attorney and CPA, defeated J.J. Moussey, a retired police officer, for the position 3 seat. Incumbent Michael Glover did not seek re-election.

Meader, a subsea engineer, defeated incumbent Nathaniel Richardson Jr., an adjunct instructor, and Kent Kirby, a business owner, for the position 4 seat.

Following the swearing-in ceremonies, trustees selected Hartman board president, Position 7 Trustee Rose Jones as vice

## New 175-acre residential development coming to Fulshear

M/I Homes, a home building company, is developing a 175-acre residential development in Fulshear, with homes expected for presale in early 2023.

The plan for Summerview, to be at 5613 FM 359, is for 414 homesites, with more than 20 floor plans available to consider for homes that can have between

3-5 bedrooms and can be either one or two stories.

Expected prices will range from the mid-\$200s to low-\$300s. The land was purchased in 2021.

The company is also planning for walking trails surrounding the pond and neighborhood as well as a playground for young children.

Tim Sojka, broker of the See TIM Sell Team at Keller Williams and Katy Times real estate columnist, said Fulshear growing

because its leaders have made good decisions on community and residential growth.

"Like Katy, Fulshear has repeatedly made good decisions on the housing inventory added to the market," Sojka said. "They seem to understand the consumers coming west."

Sojka said the success of the schools in a neighborhood

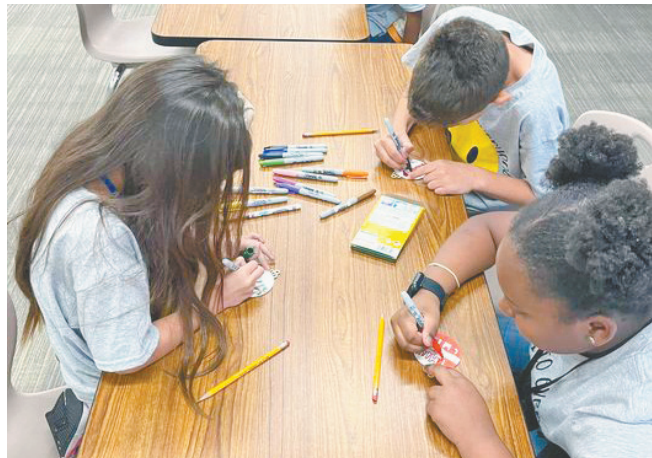

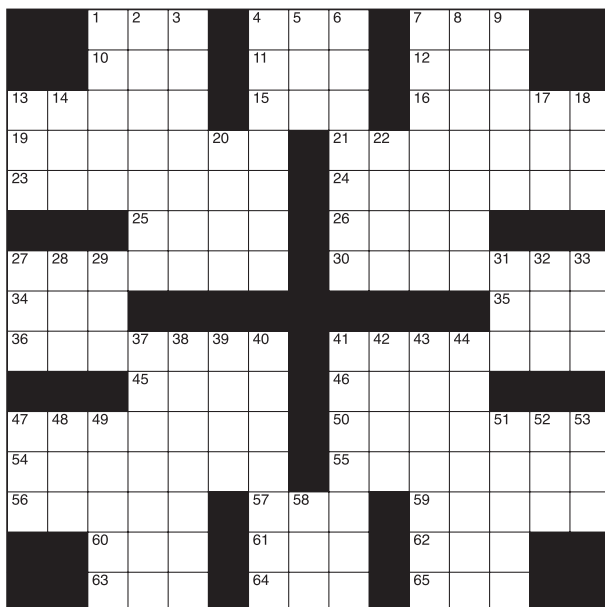

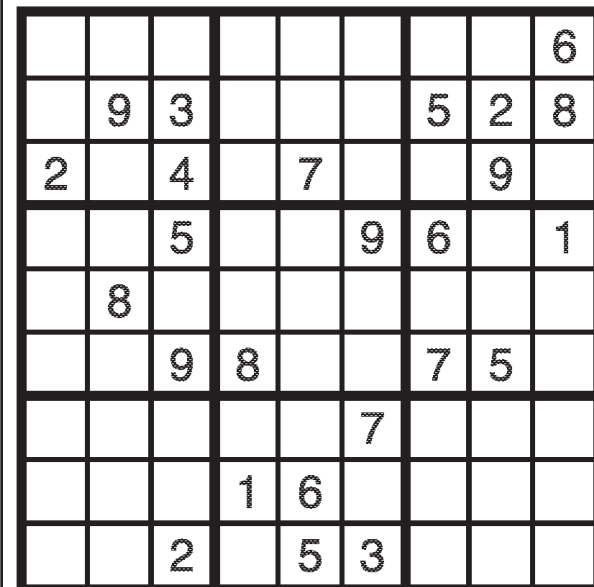

Junior High and McElwain Elementary. All three schools opened in the last five years.

Sojka said how the schools perform will control how the neighborhoods will deliver over the next decade.

"In Katy's history, they've proven they have a great plan for that," Sojka said. "In 77494, the schools have

flourished, and the neighborhoods have flourished."

The future single-family development property is less than three miles from the Grand Parkway.

Katy Hockley Cutoff Road is currently being expanded from two lanes to four, which is expected to ease area growth.

The development is also

near several Harris County Pct. 4 facilities such as the John Paul Landing Park and Paul D. Rushing Park, which have a combined total acreage of roughly 1,100 acres.

A Harris County Juvenile Facility and Harris County Juvenile Leadership Academy are nearby, as is a Harris County Precinct Constable's office.

determine the success of the neighborhood. The Summerview homes, when completed, will be in Lamar CISD.

Students living in the planned development would be attending Fulshear High School, Leaman Junior High School, Roberts Middle School and Morgan Elementary School.

The district is among the fastest-growing in Texas, and voters earlier this month approved about \$1.5 billion in bonds for new buildings and campus improvements.

"Lamar CISD has one of the best teacher-student ratios out there," Sojka said. "School districts like Lamar CISD have done a better and better job serving students. I've been impressed with Lamar CISD."

M/I Homes, Inc., is a builder of single-family

This first student said Teagle inappropriately touched her and her best friend. Both these students, the charging documents said, are 15 years of age.

This first student said Teagle began with inappropriate comments, which turned into inappropriate hugs. The hugs, the first student said, began with Teagle's hands around the waist and slowly moved lower onto the buttocks. The first student said Teagle was hugging both her and the second student like that, and he told them not to tell anyone.

Later, the first student said, Teagle took these two students into a room at the high school and he said he was going to spank them. The first student said Teagle bent her over in his lap and spanked her about three times before she could get up. The documents said Teagle then spanked the second student. On Sept. 9, the charging documents said, Teagle apologized to the students for his inappropriate behavior.

The charging documents said the second student claimed that Teagle began to say inappropriate things to her.

The charging documents said on Oct. 12, three additional female students came forward with complaints about Teagle. The three students said he inappropriately touched them and made inappropriate comments. Two of these three students are 16 years of age, and the third is 15 years of age.

In addition to complaints from Paetow, the charging documents said there were complaints against Teagle from staff at Stockdick Junior High School, 4777 Peek Road. Stockdick Junior High School sits next to Paetow High School, 23111 Stockdick School Road.

The charging documents said three Stockdick staff members came forward, claiming Teagle made them feel uncomfortable on multiple occasions through inappropriate comments, touching and manners.

In October, Katy ISD said its police department was investigating an allegation

against Teagle, who resigned Oct. 11, citing personal issues. Katy ISD said it referred its findings to the Harris County District Attorney's office.

"The district takes all potential safety concerns seriously," the district said in a Nov. 21 statement. "When made aware of any allegation concerning a staff member, the individual is immediately removed from their assignments, while district personnel work swiftly with law enforcement and other agencies to conduct a thorough investigation to ensure the safety and well-being of all students."

The case is in the 351st state district court in Houston. The Times has reached out to Sean Darvishi, Teagle's attorney, for comment, but had not received a response by press time.

Teagle was in his first year at Paetow, having come from Ryan High School in Denton. The charging documents said the grand jury investigating Teagle's case sent for his work records from that district. It was discovered that he had complaints in October 2021 from Denton ISD. The complaints said Teagle told a female student there that her chest looked good to him. On another occasion, he asked a group of female students for a back rub.

The district provided no comment on how the allegations against Teagle in Denton were considered, or not considered, in its evaluation of Teagle's suitability for employment in Katy.

Teagle's situation was a tough blow for a football program that in 2021 won the Class 5A Division I state championship. The coach of that team, BJ Gotte, resigned after that season to become the coach at Pearland High School, setting the stage for Teagle's arrival at Paetow. Teagle became Paetow coach and athletic director on March 31.

David Hicks Sr. took over as Panthers coach following Teagle's resignation. The Panthers finished the 2022 season with a 5-5 record.

president, and Vahalik as secretary.

Trustees will be expected in January to consider placing a \$144 million bond package on the May 2023 election ballot. A district facilities advisory committee has worked for the past four months to develop the package, which comprises projects

focused on school safety and security, new infrastructure, renovations and remodels, and facilities improvements.

The committee will hold its final meeting Dec. 8, at which time it will choose the spokespeople to present the package in January for trustee consideration.

# Television tosses tinsel on 150 holiday films

When it comes to sappy holiday movies, you either scorn them as you would another pair of reindeer-themed socks, or you eagerly binge on offerings such as “My Southern Family Christmas,” produced by Hallmark and described thusly:

“Under the guise of a journalist, Campbell has a chance to get to know her biological father for the first time—without him ever knowing who she really is. ... Campbell must decide if she’s going to keep her identity a secret or reveal the truth to her father—a decision that will change their family Christmas forever.”

You can’t make this stuff up. Well, actually, you can if you work at Hallmark, which for the third straight year has managed to produce a cache of 40 highly-profitable holiday movies. Since imitation is the sincerest form of television (a line credited to Fred Allen), it’s not surprising that 27 different networks and streamers have jumped in this year and combined to produce a record number of largely lookalike holiday films. The industry-wide total is a remarkable 158.

For Hallmark, it’s the most wonderful time of year in terms of ratings and revenue. I estimate that the company spends a bit over \$100 million to produce its Christmas films, many of which are shot in Canada to reduce costs. The Hallmark Channel reportedly reaps about one-third of its annual revenue from the 40 projects, or about \$350 million, and this year it partnered with NBC to stream its movies on Peacock.

Leading the pack in popularity so far is “Falling for Christmas” on Netflix, which was gifted with more than 31 million views in its first four days. The draw probably isn’t the tired plot (a woman with amnesia falls for a handsome stranger at Christmas) but rather

the return of actress Lindsay Lohan after years away from the screen.

The upstart Great American Family channel produced 18 Christmas films this year and managed to stir some controversy. The service is run by Bill Abbott, a former Hallmark exec, who lured one of holiday filmmaking’s biggest stars, Candace Cameron Bure, away from Hallmark to produce and star in Christmas movies that were less secular than the sort Hallmark favors. “I knew that the people behind Great American Family were Christians that love the Lord,” Bure said in an interview, “and wanted to promote faith programming and good family entertainment.”

Hallmark, meanwhile, is

aggressively broadening its holiday storytelling and next month will offer “The Holiday Sitter,” its first Christmas film with an LGBT love story. Bure caused a fuss on social media after saying she isn’t keen on such themes.

The Lifetime channel is releasing 26 holiday titles this season. My favorite, at least based on the blurb, is “Santa Bootcamp,” in which an event planner named Emily is sent off to holiday bootcamp and meets “a drill sergeant with a heart of gold, who helps Emily rediscover the magic of Christmas and find romance along the way.”

Even the shopping channel QVC has produced a holiday film, “Holly and the Hot Chocolate,” about a food critic who finds herself stuck in the small town of Pine Falls at Christmas. But wait, there’s more! QVC is selling a special hot chocolate in partnership with gourmet retailer Serendipity.

How much holiday film fluff can viewers handle? So far, ratings are substantial, ad revenue is robust, and currently—perhaps due to economic and political malaise—the appetite appears almost limitless for formulaic fare that seems to get viewers where they want to go.

The frenzy is so great that TV is even making a Christmas movie about making a Christmas movie. “When a holiday rom-com movie shooting in her town needs a costume designer, Kerry, a local shop owner, steps into the role,” says the blurb. “She rediscovers her passion for costume design and finds herself falling for Brad, the film’s famous leading man.”

Hallmark calls this film, “Lights, Camera, Christmas!” which pretty much sums up the holiday viewing season.

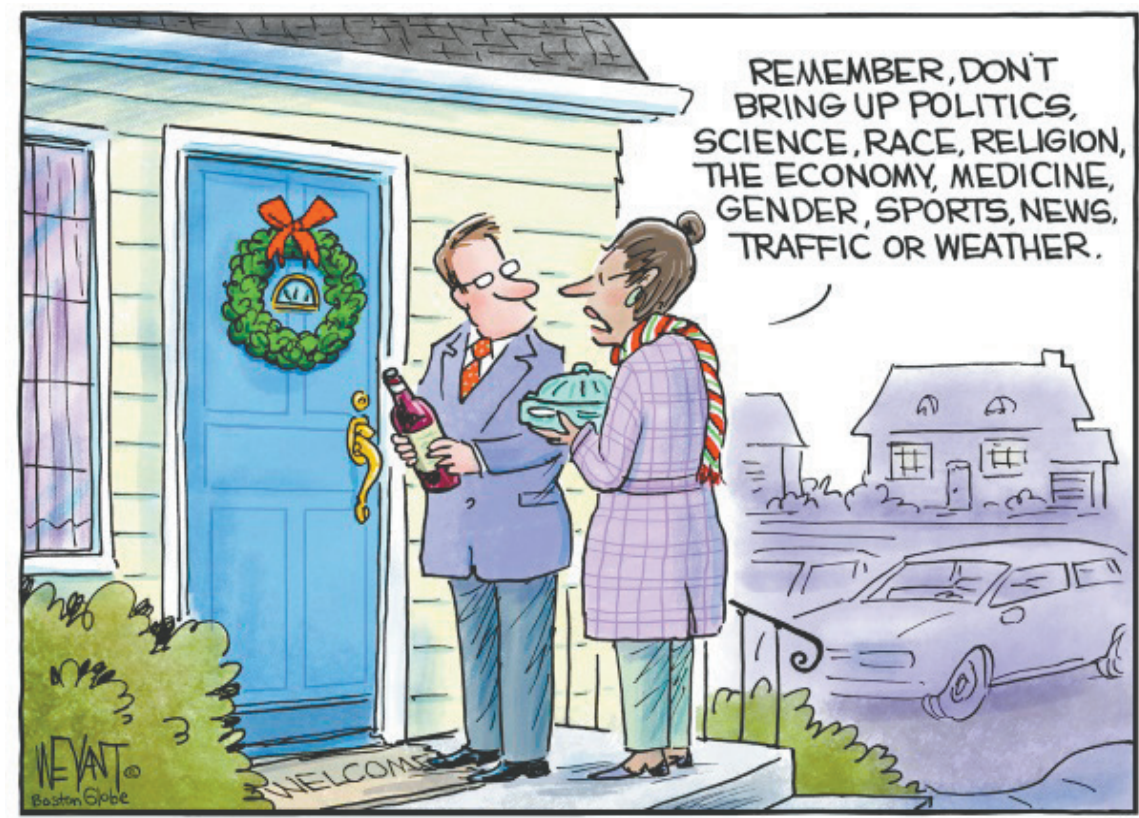

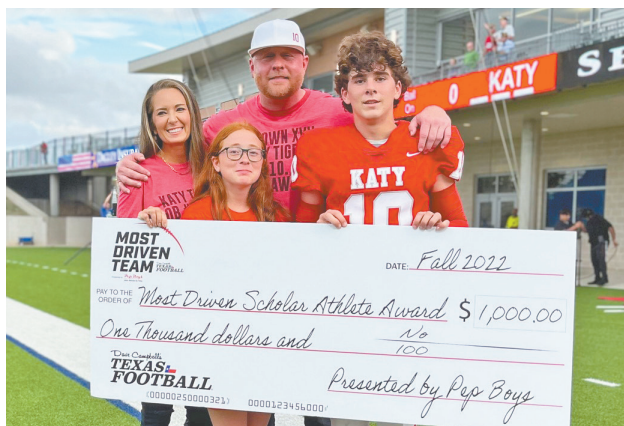

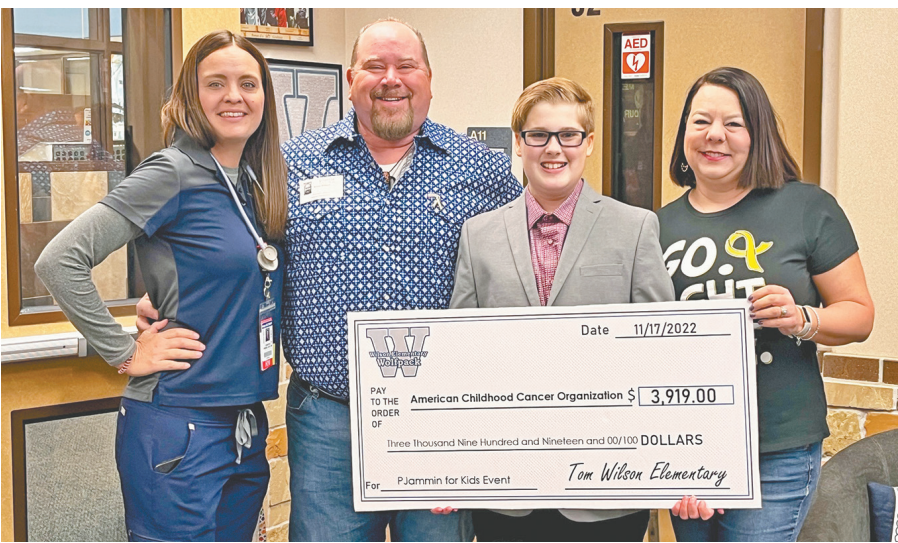
**TOMPKINS HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNA WINS AWARD**

## Cinco Ranch's season ends in regional semifinal loss

Cinco Ranch's football season came to an end Friday after a 49-21 loss to North Shore at Rhodes Stadium.

It was a tough ending to the Cougars' season after the team made it to the third round of the playoffs for the second consecutive year.

"As coaches, when you start that process over again in January, you just wonder, What is it going to look like this year? How are we going to come together as a team? Are we going to recapture some of that same magic?" Coach Chris Dudley said. "These guys did that and more."

The Cougars finished second in Katy ISD for the first time since 2017 and averaged 44 points a game with their potent offense coming into Friday's game. However, the Cougar offense was stifled and the Mustang defense allowed just 172 yards of offense.

The game started off strong for the Mustangs as senior Rashaad Johnson earned the first touchdown of the game with a 73-yard run on just the third play of the game.

Cinco Ranch answered back quickly with a 46-yard touchdown pass from senior Gavin Rutherford to senior Seth Salverino. The duo combined for another pair of passes before Salverino exited the game with an ankle injury. He did not return to the game. Rutherford rushed for a 2-yard

For the third straight season, Katy is back in a familiar place.

The Tigers once again are back in the Class 6A-Division II Region III Final, and once again are looking to push towards the school's 10th state championship trophy.

It wasn't always a foregone conclusion that Katy would get to this spot this year, but with improvements throughout the season both offensively and defensively, the Tigers are once again in a position where they can make history and claim another regional title.

"Everyone on this team knows what this is about and how we have to prepare," said senior running back Seth Davis. "They've improved every week, week in and week out everyone is getting better at learning how to do their jobs better. From spring ball to now that's been the goal — get better every week and you can see it happening at every position."

That improvement has been on display with the results of Katy's games. After very close games early in the season when playing Atascocita and Tompkins and a subpar game against Morton Ranch by Katy's standards, the Tigers flipped a switch.

Katy got to work quickly in the game, after forcing a three-and-out on Summer Creek's opening possession. The Tigers came right down the field and scored on a Seth Davis 4-yard touchdown run. The Tigers doubled that lead on their next possession as Chase Johnsey scored on a 1-yard run before they scored twice more in the second quarter on passes of 25 and 14 yards from Caleb Koger to Adam Jackson and Luke Carter respectively.

Katy scored on all but one possession in the first half while holding Summer Creek completely in check defensively.

"We knew the key for us was going to be patience," said senior running back Seth Davis. "We might not get big plays every single time, but we just had to keep pounding the rock, playing our game and eventually we would grind away at them."

Katy closed things out by continuing to be dominant in the second half. The Tigers gave up a touchdown late in the third quarter to Summer Creek on a 3-yard pass from Jahrik Jones to Roriyon Richardson, but Davis closed things out in the fourth quarter with an 18-yard touchdown run. Davis rushed for 225 yards and two touchdowns on the day on 27 carries, the first time he has had that kind of workload in months as Katy has been able to keep him fresh and healthy throughout the year.

"It comes down to my offensive line," Davis said. "They did such a good job today and so did the fullbacks, the tight ends and receivers. We knew they were a good football team but we just kept fighting and

they were able to open up some really big holes in the run game."

Defensively, Katy kept Summer Creek from ever getting in rhythm, halting any momentum they had in the pass or run game in the first three quarters and only allowing yards once the game was out of hand in the second half.

"That's who we've been all season long on that side of the ball," Joseph said. "I think we did a really good job of stopping the run and making them one dimensional. We missed some tackles and some opportunities for sacks, but that's the kind of thing we can work on and correct. I'm proud of the kids up front they did a really good job and led our offense very well."

The Tigers advance to play in the regional final, where they will meet CE King at 7 p.m. Friday at NRG Stadium.

"We have to be more physical than we were this week," Joseph said. "I think that's the one area we have to be better at against King. (Summer Creek head coach Kenny) Harrison told me that it's the most physical defensive front he's played all year — they have a lot of respect for them and we do too. We just have to come out and play our game. Be physical, run the ball and do what Katy does best."

the Panthers at 7 p.m. Friday at NRG Stadium.

"The people in this program are very unselfish and that's what we're built on," said Katy head coach Gary Joseph. "That's who we are, it's our identity. No matter how we play we have to be unselfish and do the little things for each other — the players have gotten that and understand it. Now the challenge is taking it into next week and being even better. That's what we challenge our kids to do and we've already talked about it. We have to keep progressing and not go backwards."

It's the second straight season these two teams have met in the

playoffs, with Katy coming out 41-24 winners last season. The Tigers have already faced two teams in C.E. King's district this year and beaten two teams that came out winners over C.E. King this year in Atascocita and Summer Creek. Katy will look to take out a third when they take on the Panthers.

But Katy knows it won't be easy — King has a very strong front seven, which will go head to head with Katy's offensive line as the Tigers try to reach the state semifinals for the third straight year.

King's offense runs through senior running back Keith Willis Jr. and they go as he goes. The senior has run for

1489 yards and 30 touchdowns so far this year, averaging over eight yards per carry while carrying the Panthers to the fourth round.

But no matter the opponent or situation, Katy is ready and they are excited to have a chance to prove themselves under the bright lights of NRG.

"It will be fun, but it's about winning the ballgame," Joseph said. "Our kids are going to have fun playing there and so will theirs. They're excited about it, but at the end of the day it's the next game. The focus for us is to go out and hopefully have a chance to play each of the next three weeks."

touchdown to take the lead to end the drive. After the score, North Shore found their footing and slowly ground down Cinco Ranch on both sides of the ball.

With wet and windy conditions, North Shore was comfortable keeping the ball on the ground and the team ran for 434 yards and five touchdowns. Cinco Ranch struggled in the trenches on both sides of the ball against the talented North shore linemen.

"[North Shore] has got athleticism, speed, power, so it puts a lot of stress up front and that showed today throughout today," Dudley said.

With the struggles running the ball, the Cougars stuck to the air attack despite the weather. The Mustangs earned 12 sacks against Rutherford and kept his passing accuracy to just 14-of-32 for 169 yards and one touchdown.

Utilizing a pistol formation with two running backs and a fullback, North Shore steadily moved up the field until senior David Amador fooled the defense with a play action pass and threw to junior Terrence Guillory for a 21-yard touchdown.

The Mustangs pulled away in the second

quarter with touchdown runs by Johnson and a sophomore D'Andre Hardeman.

Cinco Ranch's final touchdown came as the third quarter expired as Eric Eckstrom ran in a 2-yard touchdown after an 80-yard kickoff return by junior Taytum Johnson put the Cougars in the red zone.

Amador found Guillory on a similar play action pass for a touchdown in the third quarter. Hardeman and Amador each ran in a touchdown in the fourth quarter to seal the game for North Shore.

The Cougars were unable to put any more points on the board, but the team battled until the final whistle.

Cinco Ranch will look fairly different next season as three-year starters will be graduating across the line-up, but the senior class has left their mark on the team culture and history.

"I'm proud of our kids for fighting, clawing, scratching, and fighting until the bitter end," Dudley said. "This senior class did so much and I'm just really proud of what they've done for our community and our school. We're going to miss this senior class for sure."

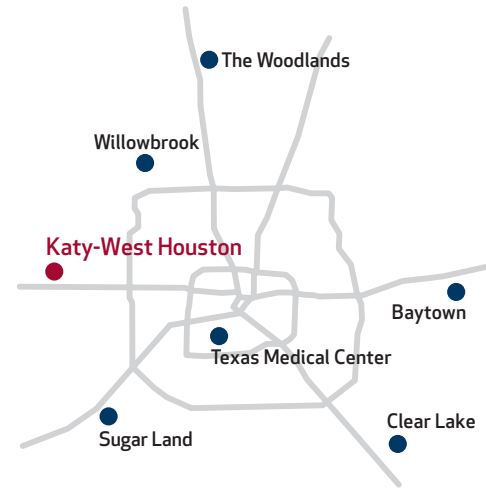
