

Martinez resigns as head of Katy Area EDC

Katy Area Economic Development Council President and CEO Chuck Martinez has resigned his position in order, he said in an interview, to pursue a new opportunity.

The resignation was effective Dec. 31.

"I provided advance notice that I would not be seeking to renew my contract so I could pursue a new career opportunity," Martinez said. "The Katy area offers a solid marketplace for global industries. It's been an honor to serve and represent the community working alongside boards, their members and many outstanding professionals

Martinez said he was not at liberty to disclose details of his new position because they were being finalized. He said he thought he would continue pursuing his passion for community economic development in his forthcoming role and hoped to share the details soon.

"God's plans have a wonderful way of presenting themselves when you least expect it," Martinez said.

In a statement, Katy Area EDC Chairman Paul Kurt said the EDC accepted Martinez's resignation with regret, and wished him well as he pursued other opportunities.

"Going forward, Angie Thomason and the staff of the EDC will continue the important work of the organization for the immediate future," Kurt said. Thomason is office manager and previously served as interim president and CEO before Martinez joined the EDC in February.

Martinez said the Katy Area EDC has a wonderful role and purpose in advancing the Katy economy. He said he hoped his tenure has reinforced the EDC's role.

As for the future, Martinez said he thought of a scene from the 1975 movie Jaws. In that scene, the police chief looking to hunt down a shark sees the shark for the first time. He tells a boat captain that he will need a bigger boat. Martinez said it's the same thing for Katy, in a manner of speaking.

American Wire Group to open Katy distribution facility

American Wire Group (AWG), a Miami-based manufacturer of wires, cables, equipment and accessories for the electric utility and renewable markets, plans to open a national distribution center in Katy.

It will be the company's third such location in addition to others in Pennsylvania and California. The Katy operation is expected to open in early 2023.

The Katy facility, which will be 205,000 sq. ft., is at 29921 Medline Lane. It will serve as the company's primary service center for customers in the Central and Southern United States. The facility will bring 30 to 50 new jobs to Katy over the next three years, the company said in a statement.

Vince Yokom, Waller County Economic Development Partnership executive director, said the building was constructed as part of a spec building program in which developers are given incentives to build facilities even though they do not yet have tenants.

Cagle welcomes first grandchild as he departs commissioners court position



Republican R. Jack Cagle lost his Harris County Pct. 4 commissioner re-election bid last year to Democratic challenger Lesley Briones. But with endings come beginnings, and in Cagle's case, it came in October with the arrival of his first grandson, Ryder Cagle.

on, Ryder Cagle. "We're a little bit behind schedule for

some folks, but my son is 32 and I actually did their wedding ceremony Jan. 9," Cagle said. "They had to skip a week, and then they went on a honeymoon a week later."

Their honeymoon, Cagle said, was driving along and exploring the returned with the

"So little Ryder was born Oct. 15," Cagle said. "Straight from getting married to having a baby. That's cool."

Cagle's departure after 11 years on commissioners court gives the Democrats a 4-1 majority on court. Incumbent Democratic County Judge Lina Hidalgo and Pct. 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia won their respective re-election bids. Pct. 3 Commissioner Tom Ramsey is the court's only Republican.

Cagle's precinct was redrawn to include Katy and much of western Harris County following the 2020 census. Critics of the redistricting plan, including Cagle, said the redistricting was done in such a way that Cagle would have a harder time winning re-election.

Looking back, Cagle found it hard to summarize all that happened on his watch.

"The problem with that simple question is that there are so many areas that I've had the privilege of serving in that it makes it more complex," Cagle said. On infrastructure, he said the completion of state highways 99 and 249, along with the expansion of the Hardy Toll Road and the contact points, were highlights.

"To me it's very exciting to get on 99 and to be able to drive all the way around to Kingwood, and to realize when I first started that that wasn't happening," Cagle

Cagle said the county's biggest challenging moving forward was managing its growth.

"And there's going to be also attached to that the green space component, because at some point you're going to run out of land and we won't have a place to go," Cagle said.

One program he was involved with,

Fort Bend County Sheriff's office awarded traffic safety grants

The Fort Bend County Sheriff's office has launched a comprehensive traffic safety initiative, funded by a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation, to address increasing numbers of vehicle crashes and fatalities in the county.

The Strategic Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) provides funding for qualified traffic safety programs designed to reduce traffic crashes and fatalities. The \$124,990 grant will help the sheriff's office deploy more personnel and resources to actively seek drivers who violate traffic laws, such as speeding, distracted driving, DWI and seat

Sheriff Eric Fagan says the STEP grant funds will be used to create safety initiatives to help enforce traffic laws to improve public safety within Fort Bend County in areas where several crashes and fatalities have been reported.

"It's simple, driving the speed limit and wearing a seat belt can prevent injuries and save lives," Fagan said. "These much-needed grants will increase our efforts of enforcing traffic laws and keep our community safe, especially now during the holidays.'





Ellis to join Association of Water Board Directors

Rick Ellis, Katy Area Chamber of Commerce vice president, is leaving that organization to join the Association of Water Board Directors. His last day at the chamber is Jan. 13.

Ellis came to the chamber in 2019 after serving as Katy Area Economic Development Council vice president.

According to its website, the association was formed in the early 1970s to promote unity and education among the various water districts in Texas. The association is an advocacy group for utility districts and has more than 900 members. The membership is made up of different types of districts, including municipal utility districts (MUDs), public utility districts (PUDs), special utility districts (SUDs),

utility districts (UDs), and water control & improvement districts (WCIDs). Each of these districts is governed by at least a five-member board of directors who live or own property in the district that they govern.

Levee Improvement Districts (LIDs) are also part of the association membership. Its directors are grass root public officials. Consultants to the industry also may join. Many of these firms or departments of firms that handle the dayto-day operations of districts are already members of AWBD. This group is made up of attorneys, developers, bookkeepers, engineers, operators, financial advisors, auditors, and so forth.

The association headquarters is in Houston.

"It makes us compete better," Yokom said. Michael Dorfman, American Wire Group CEO, said opening a Texas facility has been a priority for his company.

Cagle said, was buying drainage space before developers come in and develop their tracts. In this way, he said, the drainage system would be better than waiting until the developers put in a patchwork system. Cagle said he believed that drainage plans must handle at least 20-25% more than what is being anticipated.

On flood mitigation, Cagle said he and others were working on what he described as the "Dutch model," in which old dikes would be reinstituted on the Katy Prairie, most of which is in Waller County.

"We pay landowners to keep the land fallow and natural and we don't develop it and we've flooded whenever there's a flood, because you can store as much water going a foot deep and a mile wide as you can by going a mile deep and a foot wide," Cagle said. "So, digging the big hole is really not going to be, I think, the solution, but working with the nature conservancies and working with Waller County on the farmers and whatnot, that's what the Dutch do. They pay farmers to allow them to flood, and the benefit is that it's free fertilizer, too. All that sediment that comes in and replenishes the soil."

Cagle earned degrees from Rice University and the Baylor University School of Law in the 1980s. He was a lawyer before becoming a Harris County Civil Court-of-Law No. 1 judge. He served 11 years in that role. He was appointed to commissioners court in 2011 and won re-election in 2014 and 2018.

"It's not something that I learned, as much as I experienced, which is the love of serving people," Cagle said. "The good Lord had put my heart and desire to serve. There are different ways you can do it. I did it as a lawyer."

As for his future—besides enjoying time with Ryder—Cagle said he will return to practicing law.

"Well, you'll see me in Katy quite a bit now that I'm going to be hanging out a shingle practicing a little bit of law," Cagle said. "Before I became—actually, most of the time while I was a judge—I was a member of the Katy Bar Association. You'll see me out there and here's what I tell folks: I'm going to be available for the practice of law, but I've got a lot of experience, so I'll be a good lawyer, but I won't be a cheap one. If you need a good lawyer and you're not looking for a cheap one, just knock on my door."

in homes, the longer they present a risk.

According to the latest association winter holiday fire data, 160 home structure fires began with Christmas trees, resulting in two civilian deaths, 12 civilian injuries, and \$10 million in direct property damage, on average each year between 2015 and 2019.

Fresh Christmas trees, which continue to dry out and become more flammable over time, are involved in a much larger share of reported Christmas tree fires than artificial trees. Overall, fires that begin with Christmas trees represent a very small but notable part of the U.S. fire problem, considering that they are generally in use for a short time each year.

To safely dispose of a Christmas tree, the association recommends using the local community's recycling program, if possible; trees should not be put in the garage or left outside. The association also offers these tips for safely removing lighting and decorations so that they remain in good condition:

• Use the gripping area on the plug when unplugging electrical decorations. Never pull the cord to unplug any device from an electrical outlet, as this can harm the wire and insulation of the cord, increasing the risk for shock or electrical fire.

• As you pack up light strings, inspect each line for damage, throwing out any sets that have loose connections, broken sockets or

cracked or bare wires.
• Wrap each set of lights and put them in individual plastic bags or wrap them

around a piece of cardboard.
• Store electrical decorations in a dry place away from children and pets where they will not be damaged by water or dampness.

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

Mojo Showcase tournament returns with strong boys field



Jaguars crush Texans in Houston's final home game of season

Sunday was an ugly final home game for the Texans in this 2023 season, capping off what has been an ugly season at

home for Houston. The Texans fell to the Jaguars 28-3 at NRG Stadium, falling to 2-13-1 on the season in a game where Houston was never in it from start to finish.

'They just played a lot better than we did today," said Texans head coach Lovie Smith. "We had been playing better football but that wasn't the case today in all three phases. We didn't tackle defensively and we didn't move the ball or get in the endzone offensively. We just weren't ready to play on the same level we needed

Things went wrong from the opening drive, as Jeff Driskel was stuffed on a fourth-and-one in Houston territory, giving the Jaguars a short field to work with. Jacksonville made no mistakes and marched 45-yards in eight plays before scoring on a 5-yard run by Jamycal Hasty to take the lead.

The Texans and Jaguars traded punts twice after that before the Texans punted once again in the second quarter. Jacksonville finally made them pay, as Travis Etienne ripped off a 62-yard run for a touchdown before Tyson Campbell recovered a strip sack of Davis Mills and returned it for another Jaguars touchdown just a minute later on the Texans next drive.

"It's tough," Mills said. "You get here and you expect to have a chance to win every week, but it's been a struggle this year. The record doesn't show how tal-

Texas Tech tops Ole Miss in dominant Texas Bowl play

There was a lot of talk this week heading into the Texas Bowl about the run game and defense of Ole Miss.

The Rebels were third in the nation in rushing heading into the game, and it seemed to be something they would be able to exploit against a Texas Tech team that had defended well against the pass but struggled at times against the run. And Ole Miss' defense that went up against tough SEC teams seemed to be set up to be able to have an answer for the Texas Tech offense.

But the Red Raiders flipped the script on that narrative on Wednesday night, as it was Texas Tech that were the aggressors both in the run game and on defense as they ground and pound to a 42-25 win over Ole Miss in the Texas Bowl at NRG Stadium to end Joey McGuires' first season with the team on a very high note.

"There's been some special moments in my career, and this is one of them," said Texas Tech head coach Joey McGuire. "To be able to finish this off with the guys, it was so special because when you're a new coach coming in somewhere and doing things different it takes buy in and acceptance and they gave that to us from day one. They play every game so hard and it shows that they believe in what were doing and they love each other. Tonight showed that."

Tech's defense made its presence felt from the start, forcing a turnover on downs on Ole Miss' first possession. The Red Raiders then moved the ball down the field but gave the ball away on an interception by Tyler Shough in the endzone.

But after another turnover on downs by the Rebels, Shough made up for his mistake, running in a 2-yard score to give Texas Tech the lead. Ole Miss came back to tie things up, going 75-yards on five plays and scoring on a Zach Evans 8-yard run, but Tech regained the lead on its next possession when Trey Wolff nailed a 42-yard field goal late in the first quarter.

Tech's defense continued to excel, forcing an interception on the next drive and after the Tech offense turned the ball over on downs, the Red Raiders did it again, with Marquis Waters returning it back inside the 10-yard line to set up the Red Raider offense. Shough took advantage, running in a 2-yard score, before Trey Wolff added another field goal later in the half after yet another turnover on downs by Ole Miss gave Tech the ball back.

And the Red Raider defense wasn't done either, as they forced a fumble inside Ole Miss territory and recovered, setting the Tech offense up with a short field, Shough led the team on a 5-play 37-yard drive that ended with a 12-yard touchdown pass from Shough to Jerand Bradley as Tech took a 26-7 lead into half time after dominating the

In total, Texas Tech forced three turn-

overs in the half, two coming from interceptions and one coming from a fumble while they also forced three turnovers on downs.

"We knew coming into this game that they had a good offense and some great backs," said Marquis Waters, a senior safety. "We knew how explosive they were and we had to be at our best today. We tried to force them to throw the ball and it worked. We stopped the run and it just forced them out of their comfort zone."

Ole Miss came out with momentum to start the second half. Tech was forced to punt and then the Rebels put together a 10-play 80-yard drive that culminated in a Jaxson Dart 11-yard pass to Jordan Watkins. Things seemed to be heading even more in the Rebels' way after they forced a missed field goal, but a punt gave the ball back to Tech. Tech promptly fumbled and gave the ball back to Ole Miss but the Red Raider defense came up huge once again, forcing a turnover on downs as the Red Raiders went

into the fourth quarter leading by 13.

The Tech offense finally broke through early in the fourth, as SaRodorick Thompson made things a three possession game by running in a 4-yard touchdown to cap off an 11-play 71-yard drive and the Tech defense forced their eighth turnover of the game on the next possession, as Ole Miss fumbled inside the Texas Tech 10-yard line to give the Red Raiders the ball back. But Ole Miss continued to try to get into things, scoring on a 9-yard Dart run, forcing a fumble through the endzone for a touchback as a Tech player was coming close to the endzone. The Ole Miss offense came right back down the field, scoring on a 19-yard touchdown pass from Dart to Malik Heath making things a 10-point game.

But Tech again had the answer, as Loic Fouonji scored on the ensuing onside kick attempt, returning it 44 yards to seal the game.

tempt, returning it 44 yards to seal the game.
"We just took advantage of our opportunities and the defense put us in a lot of really

great spots with how they played," Shough said. "We just were able to capitalize on that when the defense helped us and our run game really stepped up. The o-line played so well and had a great game and we just played through them."

Shough, who was named the game's MVP after passing for 242 yards and a touchdown while running for 117 yards and two touchdowns, announced he was returning for his final year of eligibility after the game. The Red Raiders end the year with an 8-5 record, their best record since 2013. With the talent Texas Tech is returning the future only looks brighter as well.

"Having this momentum going into the offseason is so big," McGuire said. "You play a long season to get to here and this was the guys' reward. Our guys had such a great time this week and to cap this off with a win was so great. It builds that positive momentum heading into spring. You build your young players and reward your seniors this way."

Marhofer. "Justice is so good at finding those gaps in the zone and reading the game that we knew we couldn't do that. We helped wherever we could on her but Brianna Nelson made Justice work for every single basket she got. Everyone knew their role and executed it. We pressured the guards, fronted the post, boxed out — it was a complete team effort."

Seven Lakes led by six after the first quarter and by three at halftime. The Spartans' lead was trimmed to two heading into the final quarter and that's when the Tigers really started to take over, clamping down on defense and finding ways to score out on the break.

Katy seems to have different contributors every game and on Tuesday it was Ella Robinson who stepped up down the stretch, making two clutch baskets and scoring six of her 10 points in the final frame.

"She was so composed in such a big situation," Marhofer said. "Ella is such a competitive kid and we recognized that she could get to the rim every possession that she wanted to. I was just telling her to read the situation and be aggressive going to the rim. She had an attack mentality and went at the rim. She finished so well around the rim tonight and played phenomenally."

Katy had four players finish with double digit points, as Nyla Wold had 14 points,

Barr had 12 points, Robinson had 10 and Nelson also finished with 10.

It was the Tigers 15th straight win on the year as they improve to 7-0 in district play. The Tigers face Taylor Friday before taking on Tompkins next Tuesday in a matchup that could potentially decide the district champion.

"Some teams think they can lock down one or two girls and that's it, but were so unique because we have so many people that can all attack and score," Robinson said. "This team doesn't have a weakness because if one of us is off, there's always another to pick them up. We're so well rounded and that's why we're going to keep going."

ented this team is. We have found ways to fight and play teams really close all season long — we just haven't finished games."

The Texans got the ball back and punted once again, but the Houston defense finally came up with a big play on the next drive, when Desmond King intercepted Trevor Lawrence and returned it in Jacksonville territory to set the Houston offense up with good field position.

But in the end it didn't matter, as the Texans wasted the opportunity, turning it over on downs in the redzone, as the Jaguars defense came up with another stop.

Jacksonville took a 21-0 lead into the second half after holding Houston to just 94 yards of total offense, as the Texans averaged under three yards per play in the first half, while the Texans run defense continued to struggle as Etienne ran for over 100 yards in the first half, averaging 12 yards per carry.

"Etienne is a good running back and he's been playing really good ball," Smith said. "But our job is to get him down guys like him are going to get to the second level and when that happens you have to tackle. We just had too many missed tackles and you can't have that. That's what run defense is about is making those tackles."

The Jaguars picked up where they left off quickly in the third, as they went on an 11-play, 75-yard drive to open the half before Snoop Connor made things 28-0 on a 3-yard run. The Texans finally responded after that, going 37 yards on seven plays before Ka'imi Fairbairn hit a long, 56-yard field goal to get Houston on the board.

The Jaguars went to their backups as

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the third quarter was coming to a close, and Jacksonville was still able to drive down the field with ease but were eventually kept out of the endzone when Jalen Pitre recorded his fifth interception of the year. But once again, the Texans offense responded with a turnover on downs, the team's third of the day. The two teams went back and forth in the fourth quarter until the Jaguars added to their lead on a 53-yard field goal to cap off the Jaguars win as the Texans offense could do nothing the rest of the way.

"They played us well — in the run game and in the pass game they made things difficult for us," Mills said. "We just have to find ways to continue to make plays. Maybe if I could have hit a couple more passes down the sideline when they were open it helps us, but we missed opportunities. We have to find a way to play well for four quarters and have a chance to win at the end."

Davis Mills finished with 202 yards through the air on 18 of 34 passing and was also the team's leading rusher, running for 33 of the Texans' 79 yards on the ground.

Houston ends the season without a home win, losing seven and tying one. They will travel to play the Colts next week in search of just their third win overall, hoping to put a bright spot on what has

been an otherwise disappointing season. "Our play just was not good enough in any part of the game," Smith said. "That starts with me as the head football coach and I have to be better. We have one more chance to get this bad taste out of our mouth and we need to do that next week."

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Houston picked second in AAC; 3 Cougars earn preseason honors

The University of Houston baseball team was selected to finish second in the American Athletic Conference Preseason Coaches Poll, the conference announced Wednesday.

The Cougars earned 39 votes from the conference's head coaches behind only East Carolina who had 49. Houston beat out UCF for second place as the Knights tallied 38 votes in third. The full poll can be seen

Along with the Cougars' second-place nod, junior catcher Anthony Tulimero, redshirt senior shortstop Ian McMillan and junior third baseman Zach Arnold were selected to the Preseason All-Conference

McMillan, a Scottsdale, Ariz. native, was a unanimous selection after a standout season in 2022. He finished the season batting .302 and was second on the team in home runs (10). The 2022 Brooks Wallace Award

Semifinalist closed out his 2022 campaign with 40 runs, 64 hits and 40 RBI and was a unanimous selection to the Preseason All-Conference team.

Houston's backstop, Tulimero, returns for another season leading the Cougars. A 2022 Buster Posey Collegiate Catcher of the Year semifinalist, Tulimero led the conference in runners caught stealing with 23 while also leading the team in batting average (.326) and hits (76). During the 2022 season, the California native had 21 multiple-hit games and posted 44 runs, 39 RBI, 11 stolen bases and a .994 fielding percentage.

Arnold, the Cougars starting third baseman, was also selected to the Preseason All-Conference team. The California native was a 2022 Gold Glove Finalist and the American's lone third baseman with one or no errors in 160-plus chances. Arnold posted a .283 batting average in 2022 with 44 runs, 65 hits, 10 home runs, 45 RBI and nine stolen bases.



during the 2021 season in which they reached the state semifinals and won the District 19-6A championship.

Robertson helped Navarro to a 6-4 record and 5-2 conference record as a freshman. Navarro reached the Southwest Junior College Football Conference Semifinals this year, losing a heartbreaker to New Mexico Military Institute, 24-23 to end the Bulldogs season.

Robertson was primarily used as a kicker in his freshman year although he did have a few punts as well. He made four of his nine field goals on the season, good for 44% overall, with a long of 36 yards, while making 33 of his 37 extra points, nailing 89% of his extra point tries and totaling 45 points on the year.

Robertson only had two punts on the season, totaling 89 yards for an average of 44.5 yards per punt. Robertson joins a Henderson State team that competes in Division II in the Great American Conference. The Reddies went 8-3 overall last season, including 5-1 at home.



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
