County preparing for 2023 infrastructure bond

Fort Bend County commissioners are talking with local officials and the public to identify items for a possible bond for county voter consideration in November.

"All the precinct offices are working with (Fort Bend County) engineering to establish a list of what the precincts need, and also what our municipalities need," Pct. 1 Commissioner Vincent Morales said. "Also, engineering has its own list it will be presenting to us. The summer is when will call for an election, but we have to put out the list and what the cost will be."

Pct. 3 Commissioner Andy Meyers said the county is working to develop a project list where projects are jointly decided upon. "We have a lot of old roads," Meyers said, adding that the county is performing paving assessments of its roads and bridges so it can assess conditions and identify the most critical needs.

"It's becoming a safety issue," Meyers said. "That's one of the things we're really going to be focused on this summer. We're meeting with cities and MUDs to address some of this older infrastructure that needs a program for fixing."

Morales said there has always been a city/county list of priorities.

"Each commissioner meets with the cities in their precincts," Morales said. "They have their lists, and we ask them to prioritize the projects. More often than not, it's a joint funding between the city and the county. That's what we've done in the past, and I anticipate that's what we'll do in the future."

When the commissioners finalize the project list and its cost, they will call for the bond election in August. No final figure has been settled upon, but Meyers said he expected the county to contribute about \$400 million—essentially \$100 million per precinct. He said commissioners will work with

Screenings important in treating colorectal cancer

March was Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, but for people ages 45 and older, it's always wise never mind the month—to get themselves screened, a Katy doctor said.

"Basically, it's a cancer of the colon or rectum," Dr. Tareq Kamal, a colorectal surgeon at Houston Methodist West in Katy, said. "It happens on the inside of the colon or the rectum. It can grow and spread towards lymph glands and other organs."

The American Cancer Society recommended recommends colorectal cancer screening when one turns 45. If one has a family cancer history, screenings should start earlier than that. One might be at a higher risk for colorectal cancer if one has a family history of this cancer, a personal history of colorectal polyps, inflammatory bowel disease, such as Crohn's and ulcerative colitis, or genetic syndromes, including Lynch syndrome and Familial Adenomatous Polyposis (FAP). "Routine screenings can help prevent colorectal cancer or find it at an early stage, when it's smaller and more easily treatable," Kamal said. "Caught early, we can often remove the cancer fully and achieve better outcomes." Kamal said about 106,000 new cases of colorectal cancer are diagnosed in the US each year. This is the third-most common cancer diagnosed. Kamal said the rate of men getting this cancer is 33% higher than women. Kamal is new to Katy-he relocated to Texas last September-but he's been a surgeon since 2007 and completed his training in colorectal cancer treatment in 2016. He did his residency in Chicago and practiced medicine in Michigan before coming to Texas. A surgeon like Kamal sees a patient after the patient has had a colonoscopy and the cancer diagnosis has been confirmed. The patient undergoes a CAT scan to make sure the cancer hasn't metastasized and spread elsewhere. The patient undergoes a full exam and the surgeon checks the patient's family history. Based on these results and routine bloodwork, he said, the next step in the treatment is decided upon. The type of surgery performed depends on the location of the tumor, Kamal said. "We use minimally invasive, robotic techniques, to remove these cancers," Kamal said, adding that the robotic surgeries have been used for at least the last 10 years.

"Moderate growth scenarios project a student enrollment of over 100,000 students by 2027 and nearly 10,000 more by 2032," Kris Pool, PASA planning director, said. "Over the next 10 years, PASA projects 27,681 single-family units, which is approximately 60% of the total new housing projections."

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



flexible spaces.

Additionally, the group reviewed Katy ISD's long-range facilities plan which has guided the district through more than nine bonds the Katy community

has passed since 1994. The plan documents every facility in the district, along with life expectancies for the building's mechanical and plumbing systems, roofs, and

interior finishes," Lisa Kassman, Katy ISD facilities, planning and construction director, said. "Addressing these campus needs and updating systems when needed, is a priority in order to

the county's budget officer and auditor to make sure the figure fits within the county's financial ability. He said the cities and MUDs would also contribute, making the total figure to be about \$600-\$700 million.

'We have to figure out what the priority projects are within a bond amount that the voters will go along with," Morales said.

Morales said Katy, a part of which is in his precinct, has submitted a project, as has Fulshear, but some of other cities in his precinct have not done so — at least, not yet. Some of the money, Morales said, might be applied to unfinished projects where construction money might be needed.

Meyers said the county had

\$100 million of excess costs related to inflation with regard to the county's our old mobility projects that we're going to have to cover. The county committed to do the projects, he said, but securing the right-of-way and getting the utility companies to move can take up to a couple of years.

In one case, Meyers said, he had what he called "one dinky

little road" where the utility did not want to check its pipeline. As a result of delays, he said, the project cost has gone up. Meyers said that particular road is now in Morales' precinct.

Commissioners welcome public input as they prepare their list.

"They can contact Vincent, or myself, or any of the commissioners," Meyers said.

The technology has become more available to doctors and they have more experience with them, he said.

"The results of been very positive and comparable to other forms of surgery," Kamal said, adding that one benefit of the technology is that patients tend to have shorter hospital stays.

Kamal said rectal cancer is treated differently from colon cancer. Rectal cancer is more complex, he said, and the patient will undergo an MRI so the medical team can decide the best options for surgery and treatment.

While age and family history are beyond a patient's control, it is possible to reduce risk for colorectal cancer by following some basic guidelines. Kamal said eating a healthy diet, exercising regularly, losing weight, and avoiding tobacco, and limiting or avoiding alcohol can all help lower the risk of colorectal cancer. Such a diet, Kamal said, would involve reducing or avoiding red meat and processed foods. As for exercise, Kamal said, any form of exercise that lowers one's body mass index (BMI) and improves cardiac ability are good.

The sun is shining today and Spring is upon us. Such days remind me still of the excitement I knew when I turned 16 in April and was finally able to get my driver's license—a wondrous rite of passage fewer and fewer teens choose to experience today.

According to a 2019 article in The Wall Street Journal, in the 1980s half of all 16-year-olds were driving. But by 2020 it was just 25 percent.

Why?

Driving tests began getting stricter and more challenging in many states in the mid-1990s—though passing my test in a 1976 "Starship-Enterprise-sized" station wagon was no easy feat.

The cost of cars has risen and today's teens are able to get around easily enough using ride-sharing services.

But the biggest reason is simply that many teens have zero desire to drive on their own because the hunger to get out of the house and socialize is no longer a big incentive.

A study by Common Sense Media finds that teens are spending an average of eight hours a day on social media apps.

They may think their online habits are enabling them to socialize with "friends," but several studies, including a 2021 Journal of Adolescence study, see a clear correlation between the explosion in social media in 2012 and increasing isolation, depression and anxiety in teens.

A 2020 Netflix documentary, "The Social Dilemma," explains in detail how the nature of social media encourages teen isolation and depression.

When you're online, powerful artificial intelligence tools algorithms—monitor everything you do. Plus, the tools know your full name, marital status, gender, age, birthday, political views and several of your interests.

dopamine spikes and keep you online as long as possible—so their advertisers have neverending access to sell to you.

As you spend time online with social media apps, you are constantly being psychologically manipulated—constantly comparing your looks to famous people, constantly seeking praise and "likes" from strangers or suffering deeply if someone online in any way mocks or criticizes one of your posts.

It's pretty clear that young people, whose brains are still developing, are being profoundly impacted by social media in many important and trivial ways we don't fully understand yet.

Which brings us back to driving. Instead of becoming excited at age 16 that they can learn to drive a car and come and go freely, too many kids are content to sit alone in their rooms endlessly texting each other or consuming TikTok.

It's too bad. Kids today don't know how much fun, freedom and real social interaction they're missing without cars.

Cruising the park in a 1972 VW Beetle with my friends is one of the best memories I have of my teen years.

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Jacqueline Ruyle wins Texas Children's Hospital Grand Prix

In an exciting conclusion to the \$30,000 Texas Children's Hospital Grand Prix, Jacqueline Ruyle and her horse, Cyramo Z, claimed victory by just 0.004 seconds at the Pin Oak Charity Horse Show.

Ruyle and Cyramo Z were one of eight entries to advance to the April 1 jump-off at the Great Southwest Equestrian Center. As the second pair to return for the Oscar Soberon-designed short course, Ruyle and Cyramo Z blazed across the finish in 37.423 seconds.

Arizona's Allison Kroff and her horse T-Quick Hurricane Z, owned by TC Sport Horses LLC, flew through the finish in a nearly identical time of 37.427 seconds to take second place. Finishing in third place were Martien Van Der Hoeven and her horse Mefisto II Mondo, owned by Brieanne Dofort.

"It's awesome." Ruyle said. "My family's here. My brother's here, and his new wife is here. It's really cool because my family can just drive in and watch; people that really haven't seen me compete before can watch."

Saturday night marked Ruyle and Cyramo Z's second Pin Oak grand prix victory in as many years. The duo first topped the \$50,000 Hildebrand Fund Grand Prix in 2022. Since that inaugural Pin Oak grand prix victory, Ruyle and Cyramo Z's winning resume has grown. In July 2022, they earned their first FEI win, and they have since racked up several others.

"[Cyramo Z] is so fast and so brave," Ruyle said of the horse. "We had a very successful winter circuit in Wellington. We won almost every class we entered – we won the welcome, we won the prix, we won the next welcome. Five-year study examines health of bees in East Texas

The American bumblebee population is alive and well in East Texas, according to early indications from a five-year research project.

The project, which started in 2022, is a collaboration between Stephen F. Austin State University, Sam Houston State University and Texas A&M Forest Service to assess the health of It's a good sign, Bennett said, because the American bumblebee is not doing well in other parts of its range and is being considered for protection under the Endangered Species Act.

that's a very good sign."

"It's very early to say, and maybe we'll get different results this year, but the early indications are that the American bumblebee is doing well here," he said. "And that's very important because it has almost disappeared from places like Pennsylvania and Massachusetts."



len grains collected from the bees. Williams said his team has identified about 80% of the pollen from the bees trapped during the study's first year.

"We are trying to find the diet of these bees," Williams said, with the goal of introducing more of the flowers that the bees prefer.

Williams said sampling locations and methods will be refined through the

bee communities in 74 East Texas counties. The survey is funded through a \$500,000 state grant.

Dan Bennett, an associate professor of biology at Stephen F. Austin State University, said the results from samples collected in the study's first year are positive.

"We're catching lots of bumblebees of multiple species, and we're capturing quite a few of the American bumblebee," said Bennett, the lead entomologist for the project. "We're finding them most places we look, and

said the bees are attracted to the bright color of the traps, which are set across both urban and rural areas.

"Traps are placed anywhere from fence lines around airports to the edge of rights of way to open forest canopy where we would have flowering plants nearby," he said.

Photos are taken of the area where the traps are set "so we can look at the vegetation and see what's growing there," Smith said.

Smith said the agency's involvement streamlined the project, allowing an established network of statewide personnel to cover a lot of ground in setting and collecting the traps so researchers could focus on analyzing the data.

Smith developed a computer application for the collection teams to log data related to the traps, allowing the university teams to see when and where the traps were placed and when they were collected.

It makes sense for Texas A&M Forest Service to play a role in the study, Smith said, because of the agency's access to the land throughout the region where the study is being conducted as well as the agency's experience surveying insects in forests of East Texas.

"Everyone that's working on this project for us deserves credit. We even have fire personnel out there helping out," Smith said.

Early questions

Questions have already

emerged from the study's early findings, Bennett said.

"Are they going to decline soon? Is there a disease coming? What's the difference between here and where the populations have already declined?" he said.

The samples will give researchers an idea of how the bumblebee population is doing, Bennett said, and possibly shed light on where they might be in the future.

"We want to know where the bees are, why they are there, and how that relates to human activities," Bennett said. "We're looking at the entire landscape and the correlates of habitat diversity."

Counting pollen

Along with American bumblebees, the researchers are focusing on populations of long-horned bees, which are important pollinators of agricultural crops. As the project progresses, the pollen from the bee samples will be used to determine floral relationships.

"We'll try to figure out which types of plants are represented on the bees based on the pollen that they carry," Bennett said. "Maybe there are certain flowers that they need that we don't quite know just yet."

Justin Williams, a biological sciences professor at Sam Houston State University, serves as the botanist for the research project.

Using scanning electron microscopes, Williams and his students identify the polstudy's third year.

"That's when we're going to start bringing all of our data together," Williams said. "Then we'll start working on a modern inventory of the bees that we have."

Williams said he's hoping to find species of bees that haven't been seen in decades.

"It's not that they've gone extinct or disappeared, it's just that people haven't looked for them," he said. "Natural history just isn't as appreciated today as it should be, and that's why this project is so important."

A teaching tool

In addition to the bee survey and pollen analysis, researchers are planning to incorporate an educational outreach component.

"We'll be visiting Master Gardeners and botanical gardens and giving talks, and it's our aim to make a poster that we can give out that has general information on identification of the bees of East Texas along with photos of the more common bees," Williams said.

Part of that educational message, Williams said, is that we need more natural areas for bees and other species to thrive.

"Let those wildflowers be out there, because they are food for the bees," he said. "Part of the reason bees might be struggling is our insistence on mowing all the time. You can mow, but let's do that after the flowers have finished blooming."

Bennett said he hopes the research highlights the significance of bees and the role they play in the ecosystem.

"Without them, we would be left with fewer things to eat, or the things we have to eat would be much more expensive," he said. "I want people to appreciate what bees are doing for us and understand that if they decline, in a way, so do we."

Home Run Dugout, the first-ever sports bar, restaurant, and entertainment venue featuring indoor soft-toss baseball, is now open in Katy at 1220 Grand West Blvd. A brand-new way to play baseball with friends, Home Run Dugout has reinvented the batting cage, offering an immersive, social gamified playing experience suitable for sluggers of all ages and skill levels.

Co-founded by Nick Hermandorfer and Tyler Bambrick, Home Run Dugout was founded with the dream to have everyone experience the greatest feeling in sports: hitting a home run. Austin-based Hermandorfer, who graduated as a two-sport NCAA athlete from Princeton University, has always been passionate about the power of sports bringing people together. After working in the start-up world in Austin, he decided to pursue an MBA at the University of Texas and launched Home Run Dugout, LLC in 2015.

A Houston native, Tyler Bambrick, co-founder and COO of Home Run Dugout, is a proud graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. While living and going to school in Austin, Tyler joined Nick and his vision of making Home Run Dugout a reality.

In partnership with strategic investors Nolan Ryan and Ryan Sanders Baseball, Nick and Tyler opened the first Home Run Dugout in 2019 at Dell Diamond in Round Rock. The Home Run Dugout Katy location is the first full-scale standalone Home Run Dugout venue, and was brought to life through the strategic partnership of Lagniappe Capital Partners, BCS Capital, and the friends and families of Hermandorfer and Bambrick.

"People are seeking out activities to experience with friends and family besides going to a bar and watching TV," Hermandorfer said. "We believe life is all about shared experiences, and we are confident that a little friendly competition is the best way to bring people together over drinks, laughter and home runs."

The 46,000-square-foot venue has 12 indoor Batting Bays, similar to the concept of batting cages (without the cage), featuring proprietary, state-of-the-art pitching





technology and augmented reality, which allows players to simulate their hit in any Major League Baseball stadium, including Houston's Minute Maid Park, and digitally track the ball's exit velocity, distance and location.

The "secret sauce" is a patented ground-up, soft-toss pitching machine located in each Batting Bay, which safely delivers pitches over the strike-zone with no risk of foul balls, as the machine minimizes the horizontal trajectory of a pitched ball. Instead, the ball pops up from the ground. Each bay features a 20x15 foot screen and five TVs, allowing players to track not only hitting stats, but be in control of whatever sporting event or other programming they want to watch. Each Batting Bay can fit groups of up to 12 people and accommodates players of all skill levels. skill levels.

For those looking to take their game outside, the venue's Biergarten Baseball mini-field is the perfect spot for league play or a pick-up game of wiffle ball or kick ball, complete with stadium lights, an outfield net, RS3 Turf, and a vintage scoreboard. The field offers open play on a first come first served basis, and eventually will host league play, Dinger Derby tournaments, movie nights, and concerts.

Beyond the baseball experience, the venue features a full-service restaurant, concert stage, and three bars. A massive patio and biergarten wrap around the minifield, with shaded seating, fire pits, and Adirondack and hanging papasan chairs, with seating for nearly 500 guests. Partners, Matchstick by HFA and ARCO/Murray, helped bring the vision and design to life of the space, which models a baseball stadium concourse and gives visitors a broad view of the wiffle ball field diamond as soon as they enter the venue. Baseball-themed design features can be found throughout, including weathered steel walls in the main dining and bar area that mimic the color of a baseball glove. The private event space which comfortably seats up to 65 guests, with its own bar and two Batting Bays, includes a white and blue tile wall with a repeating number pattern, featuring significant numbers in baseball history.

The restaurant's extensive menu features elevated ballpark-inspired fare, with shareables like crispy chicken sliders, smoked chicken wings, and buttermilk onion rings, lighter options including a Texas cobb salad, Caesar salad, and poke bowl, and flatbreads including pepperoni and smoked brisket, among others.

Staying true to its ballpark roots, the hot dog grill serves up four different types of dogs, including a Chicago dog, ballpark classic, dugout dog with chili, spicy slaw, and crispy onions, and the NY classic with sauerkraut and mustard. Entrée plates include a classic burger, truffled patty melt, chicken tinga tacos, smoked ribeye sandwich, and smoked vardbird, among others. Dessert options include churros, classic root beer float, and a brownie sundae, and a kids meals menu with all the favorites.

"We're an immersive baseball entertainment experience, but we're also a full restaurant and bar," Bambrick said. Memorial Hermann Katy Hospital expansion underway

Memorial Hermann Katy Hospital's \$167 million expansion is progressing on schedule and hospital officials April 3 ceremonially broke ground on several associated projects, including a third medical plaza, a parking garage and the expansion of the Emergency Center and OR. Jerry Ashworth, Memorial Hermann Katy CEO, also said that a new 40bed medical/surgical acute care unit will open to patients later this week, bringing the hospital's total bed count to 254.

"Today we recognize many months of planning and countless hours of preparation that have gone into this expansion and celebrate the tremendous opportunity to continue to grow alongside our flourishing community," Ashworth said. "Our top priorities throughout this process have been to add ample physical space to accommodate more patients, and equally as important, to significantly grow our capabilities and specialty services to ensure our neighbors can access routine and complex healthcare needs close to home. As a result of this growth, we are also increasing our workforce and are actively filling several new positions here at the hospital."

Updates provided included:

Parking Garage and Medical Plaza III

Upon completion, the parking garage will add more than 600 parking spaces on the west side of the campus, while Medical Plaza

III will provide additional clinical office space for affiliated physicians. The projects are expected to be complete in 2024 and 2025, respectively.

Emergency Center and Operating Room (OR) expansion

In Phase I, the Emergency Center, which serves as the Katy area's only Level III trauma center, will double in size to 40,000 square feet and add additional treatment rooms, including two state-of-theart trauma rooms, space for more CT scanners, upgraded equipment and more. Additionally, the project will add two operating rooms, with shell space to add up to four more. Phase II will include renovations to the existing Emergency Center. The estimated date of completion for both phases is the end of 2025.

6 East opens on April 5

A new 40-bed medical/surgical acute care unit located on the sixth

floor of the East Tower opens on April 5. 6 East will serve a variety of patients, including those who are recovering from surgery or have an acute illness.

"This new unit could not have come soon enough. Our community has grown exponentially and 6 East will add patient capacity where we need it most," Vivien Bond, chief operating officer at Memorial Hermann Katy chief operating officer, said. "Every detail, from a new nursing care model focused on personalized care to the thoughtful design of the unit, was developed with our patients and their families in mind."

5 East to add 40 more beds

Construction also is underway on a 40-bed immediate care unit (IMU) on the fifth floor of the East Tower. An IMU is a step down from intensive care but provides more advanced care than the medical/ surgical acute care unit. 5 East is projected to open later this year and will increase the hospital's bed count to nearly 300.

Other projects in the works or expected to commence soon include a major overhaul of Women's Services, including relocating the nursery, doubling the number of obstetrical emergency rooms and adding labor and delivery rooms, a cesarean section suite and four neonatal intensive care unit rooms. Additionally, expansion is planned for the cardiac catheterization lab, food services spaces, the Rockets Sports Medicine Institute at Memorial Hermann Sports Park-Katy and the Memorial Hermann Breast Care Center.

The expansion is also adding job opportunities, both clinical and administrative. Qualified candidates can learn more at the website memorialhermann.org/ careers/. City adopts comprehensive plan

The Katy City Council, at its March 27 meeting, formally adopted a new 2040 Comprehensive Plan for managing the city's growth. But while the vote proved anticlimactic, the effort to reach that moment was some time in the making.

"This started in January 2022," Gary Mitchell, Kendig Keast Collaborative president, said in an interview before the council meeting. "We were still coming out of the COVID phase, so we had some outreach challenges, but we had a great response The housing growth, within the city, focuses on Katy Court, recently approved by the council, and Cane Island. But when looking at the future, Mitchell said, the focus turns to taking care of what the community now has. Infrastructure and transportation are big concerns, he said.

"Pass-through traffic is a concern," Mitchell said, adding that pass-through traffic is a concern for communities throughout the area.

"The things I've always talked about, and the council members say themselves, is, look at this city's parks and recreation facilities. Looking at those facilities got people thinking about water usage and transportation.

"There are a lot of commonalities," Mitchell said, adding that Katy voters in 2021 approved a \$4.2 million bond comprising hike and bike trail system improvements and acquisition of the parks department administration building.

"We really started on the parks plan first and got that adopted last fall," Mitchell said. "It set the stage for thinking about the city." Mitchell said he sees **BEAUTIFYING BROOKSHIRE**



to an online survey, with over 500 responses."

From there, as people continued coming out of the pandemic-induced isolation, Mitchell and his Kendig Keast colleagues held a series of town hall meetings. They gathered feedback from citizens and city leaders. Kendig Keast is a community planning firm hired by the city to update and revise the plan.

"The previous plan was around 2000-01," Mitchell said. "There was still a lot of growth for Katy in the pipeline in terms of open land and population. Really, that wave is kind of winding down now. We know what's in the pipeline." incredible small-town feel, downtown, right off the interstate that connects to all amenities of Houston," Mitchell said. "It's just that small-town atmosphere, is what's so important here."

Mitchell said he has been involved in community planning work for about 20 years. When it came to revising Katy's plan, he said the challenge was to get turnout at the town hall meetings due to the pandemic. But that was not just in Katy, but in other places as well. Even with those issues, he said, the community response has been strong.

Revising the plan began with a renewed focus on the

more opportunities than challenges when thinking about Katy's future.

"It's just the resources that Katy has been able to put into beautification, the downtown square, just how it projects itself," Mitchell said.

The plan passed unanimously.

"I am very happy with the comprehensive plan," Ward A Council Member Janet Corte said after the meeting. "It was a lot of work and will be a useful guide for future strategic planning."

The scholarship money will assist Hadnot with college financial needs while on his postsecondary journey.

"Justus is an outstanding Maverick," Julie Hinson, Morton Ranch principal, said. "Justus has not only excelled in the classroom, but he is also very active in track and very well-liked by his peers. In fact, we announced him as being a part of our 2023 prom court this morning. What a great day for Justus and his family."

Big Future simplifies the path to life after high school by recommending students take small steps to explore career interests, identify potential majors, find colleges and scholarships, and seek access to financial aid. Each step provides a student a chance at winning a scholarship.

All Class of 2024 and Class of 2025 students are now eligible to win \$500 and \$40,000 scholarships they can use at two or four-year institutions. There are no essay, test score, citizenship status, family income, or minimum GPA requirements. Drawings for \$500 and \$40,000 are held every month. Students whose families earn less than \$60,000 per year have extra chances at scholarships and earn double the entries for every drawing.

College Board has dedicated \$25 million to the program that lays out six simple steps which any student can take to get to college.






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NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF RULES AND **REGULATIONS REGARDING SANITARY AND**

from the Bluebonnet Groundwater **Conservation District in**

POLLUTION CONTROL OF THE AREAS IN PROXIMITY TO THE DISTRICT'S PUBLIC WATER SUPPLY WELL

TO ALL RESIDENTS OF AND BUILDERS WITHIN HARRIS COUNTY MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 136 AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:

- 1. Pursuant to the Texas Water Code, the Board of Directors (the "Board") of Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 136 (the "District") has adopted an Order Establishing Rules and Regulations Regarding Sanitary and Pollution Control of the Areas in Proximity to the District's Public Water Supply Well (the "Rules"), a substantive statement and the penalties for violation of which are as follows:
- 2. The Rules require the uses and construction of facilities in or on land within one hundred fifty feet (150') of the District's Water Well No. 1 (the "Well"), located at 18322 Harrow Hill Drive, Houston, Texas 77084, for the purposes of preserving the sanitary condition of water controlled by the District, to provide and regulate a safe and adequate fresh water distribution system, to protect the water supply of the District's Well by means of sanitary control, and to enable the District to comply with all applicable state and local regulations.
- 3. The construction, existence, and/or operation of the following activities within a 150-foot radius of the Well are prohibited: (a) septic tank or sewage treatment perforated drainfields; areas irrigated by low dosage, low angle spray on-site sewage facilities; absorption beds; evapotranspiration beds; abandoned, inoperative or improperly constructed water wells of any depth; underground petroleum and chemical storage tanks or liquid transmission pipelines; sewage treatment plants; sewage wet wells; sewage pumping stations; drainage ditches which contains industrial waste discharges or wastes from sewage treatment systems; animal feed lots; solid waste disposal sites, landfill and dump sites; lands on which sewage plant or septic tank sludge is applied; lands irrigated by sewage plant effluent; military facilities; industrial facilities; wood-treatment facilities; liquid petroleum and petrochemical production, storage, and transmission facilities; Class 1, 2, 3, and 4 injection wells; pesticide storage and mixing facilities; all other constructions or operations that could pollute the groundwater sources of the Well; and (b) the construction, existence and/or operation of tile or concrete sanitary sewers, sewer appurtenances, septic tanks, storm sewers, cemeteries, and/or the existence of livestock in pastures is specifically prohibited within a 50-foot radius of the Well.
- 4. Persons found to be in violation of the Rules shall be notified by the District in writing. A person who violates any of the provisions of the Rules shall be subject to a penalty of up to \$10,000 for each violation. Each day that a violation of any provisions hereof continues shall be considered a separate violation. Such penalties shall be in addition to any other penalties provided by the laws of the State of Texas and in addition to any other legal rights and remedies of the District as may be allowed by law. A court of competent jurisdiction may enjoin continued violations hereof. Persons found to be in violation of the Rules shall reimburse the District for any and all expenses incurred by the District in the enforcement of the provisions of the Rules, including without limitation reasonable fees for attorneys, expert witnesses, and other costs incurred by the District. No water or sewer tap will be permitted for any tract or parcel of land until such land is in full compliance with the Rules.
- 5. The full text of all of the District's Rules is on file in an administrative office of the District where they may be read by any interested person. The office is located at Norton Rose Fulbright, 1301 McKinney, Suite 5100, Houston, Texas 77010. You can contact the District through its website, www.hcmud136.org.

Waller County

On March 20, 2023 Enclave Gassner Tract, LLC, whose address is 24 Greenway Plaza, Suite 970, Houston, Texas 77049 filed an application with the Bluebonnet Groundwater Conservation District to drill a water well in Waller County and to produce the well at an aggregate maximum amount of 70 million gallons per year. The Applicant proposes to provide public drinking water to approximately 700 residential lots in the proposed La Segarra Subdivision located northwest of the intersection of Gassner Lane and Neuman Road in Waller County. The proposed water well will have 20-inch casing and will be capable of producing at a rate of 900 gpm. Production of the well would be managed in a manner designed to minimize interference with any neighboring wells in the same aquifer. The well will be located on the proposed La Segarra Water Plant site (33120 Gassner Lane) in Waller County MUD No. 45 with coordinates of Latitude 290 49' 58.4512" N, Longitude 950 56' 47.7855"W.

The Board of Directors of the District may grant a contested case hearing on the applications if a written request is filed within 20 days after the publication date of this notice. To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following in writing: (1) your name or for a group association, a representative), mailing address, daytime telephone number, and a fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing:" (4) a specific description of how you would be affected by the application in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the proposed activity; and (6) for a party desiring for the hearing to be conducted by the State Office of Administrative Hearings, the request must include the statement: "[I/we] request that the State Office of Administrative Hearings conduct the hearing." Note that a party requesting the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) conduct the hearing shall pay all costs associated with the contract for a SOAH hearing and will be required to deposit with the District an amount determined by the District to pay the SOAH contract amount.

You may also file written comments within 20 days after the publication date of this notice without requesting a contested case hearing.

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

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a bond election will be held in such DISTRICT, on May 6, 2023, in accordance with the following Order:

ORDER CALLING SCHOOL BUILDING BOND ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the Royal Independent School District (the "District") has the power to issue bonds pursuant to Chapter 45, Texas Education Code; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that it is necessary and appropriate to call and conduct an election to obtain voter authorization for the issuance of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, the District may enter into one or more election agreements (the "Election Agreements") with Waller County (the "County"), by and through the County's Elections Administrator (the "Administrator") and possibly other political subdivisions (the "Participants"), in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas (the "State") and applicable federal law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ROYAL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Section 1. Call of Election; Date; Eligible Electors; and Hours. An election (the "Election") shall be held on May 6, 2023 ("Election Day"), which is seventy-eight (78) or more days from the date of the adoption of this order (the "Election Order"), within and throughout the territory of the District at which all resident, qualified electors of the District shall be entitled to vote. The Board hereby finds that holding the Election on such date is in the public interest. The hours during which the polling places are to be open on Election Day shall be from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Section 2. Polling Places; Election Officers. Except as otherwise provided herein, the boundaries and territories of the respective county election precincts that are wholly or partially within the territorial boundaries of the District are hereby designated as the voting precincts of the District for the Election and the precinct numbers for the District's election precincts shall be the corresponding county precinct number of each precinct. The Election Day polling places shall be as shown in Exhibit A to this Election Order. The precinct judges and alternate judges for the Election shall be appointed in accordance with the Texas Election Code (the "Election Code").

In the event that the Superintendent, or his designee, shall determine from time to time that (a) a polling place hereafter designated shall become unavailable or unsuitable for such use, or it would be in the District's best interests to relocate such polling place, or (b) a presiding judge or alternate presiding judge hereafter designated shall become unqualified or unavailable, the Superintendent, or his designee, is hereby authorized to designate and appoint in writing a substitute polling place, presiding judge or alternate presiding judge, and correct or modify the exhibits to this Election Order, giving such notice as is required by the Election Code and as deemed sufficient.

Section 3. Propositions. At the Election there shall be submitted to the resident, qualified electors of the District the following propositions (each, a "Proposition" and collectively, the "Propositions"):

ROYAL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT - PROPOSITION A

Section 6. Early Voting. The Board hereby appoints the Administrator as the regular early voting clerk for the District. Early voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, will be conducted in accordance with the Election Code.

Early voting by personal appearance shall be conducted at the locations, on the dates and at the times as shown in Exhibit B. Early voting by personal appearance shall begin on Monday, April 24, 2023 and end on Tuesday, May 2, 2023.

For the use of those voters who are entitled by law to vote early by mail, the early voting clerks shall provide each voter with a ballot with instructions to mark the ballot indicating his or her vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the Propositions. The Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to designate the early voting ballot board and other officers required to conduct early voting for the Election.

Section 7. Conduct of Election. The Election shall be conducted by election officers, including the judges and alternate judges or clerks appointed by the Board, in accordance with the Election Agreements, the Education Code, the Election Code and the Constitution and laws of the State and the United States of America. The President of the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent, and their respective designees, are authorized to enter into, execute and deliver one or more Election Agreements, in accordance with applicable provisions of the Election Code. The terms and provisions of each Election Agreement are hereby incorporated into this Election Order. To the extent of any conflict between this Election Order and an Election Agreement, the terms and provisions of the Election Agreement shall prevail, and the President of the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent, and their respective designees, are authorized to make such corrections, changes, revisions and modifications to this Election Order, including the exhibits hereto, as are deemed necessary or appropriate to conform to the Election Agreement, to comply with applicable state and federal law and to carry out the intent of the Board, as evidenced by this Election Order. The Administrator shall be responsible for establishing the central counting station for the ballots cast in the Election and appointing the personnel necessary for such station.

Section 8. Bilingual Election Materials. All notices, instructions, and ballots pertaining to the Election shall be furnished to voters in both English and Spanish and persons capable of acting as translators in both English and Spanish shall be made available to assist Spanish language speaking voters in understanding and participating in the election process.

Section 9. Delivery of Voted Ballots; Counting; Tabulation; Canvassing of Returns; Declaring Results. The ballots shall be counted by one or more teams of election officers assigned by the presiding judges, each team to consist of two or more election officers. After completion of his responsibilities under the Election Code, including the counting of the voted ballots and the tabulation of the results, the presiding judge shall make a written return of the Election results to the District in accordance with the Election Code. The Board shall canvass the returns and declare the results of the Election.

If a majority of the resident, qualified electors of the District voting at the Election, including those voting early, shall vote in favor of a Proposition, then the issuance and sale of the bonds described in the Proposition shall be authorized in the maximum amount contained therein, and the bonds shall be issued and sold at the price or prices and in such denominations determined by the Board to be in the District's best interest. Proceeds of bonds issued and sold pursuant to each Proposition shall be used in accordance with any limitations imposed by Subsection 45.003(g), Education Code.

Section 10. Training of Election Officials. Pursuant to the Election Code, a public school of instruction for all election officers and clerks may be held as arranged or contracted by the Administrator.

Section 11. Notice of Election; Voter Information Document. Notice of the Election shall be given in the manner required by the Election Code and other applicable law. To the extent required by law, the notice of the Élection shall include the District's internet website address, which is https://www.royal-isd.net/.

A voter information document for each Proposition in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit C** is hereby approved, together with such revisions as may be approved by the Superintendent, and shall be posted and provided in accordance with law.

Section 5. Voting. Electronic voting machines may be used in holding and conducting the Election on Election Day; provided, however, in the event the use of such electronic voting machines is not practicable, the Election may be conducted on Election Day by the use of paper ballots (except as otherwise provided in this section). Electronic voting machines or paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance (except as otherwise provided in this section). As required by the Election Code, the District shall provide at least one accessible voting system in each polling place used in the Election. Such voting system shall comply with Texas and federal laws establishing the requirement for voting systems that permit voters with physical disabilities to cast a secret ballot. Paper ballots may be used for early voting by mail.

Each voter desiring to vote in favor of each Proposition shall mark the ballot indicating "FOR" the Proposition, and each voter desiring to vote against each Proposition shall mark the ballot indicating "AGAINST" the Proposition. Voting will be conducted in accordance with the Election Code.

Section 12. Notice of Meeting. The Board officially finds, determines, recites and declares that written notice of the date, hour, place and subject of the meeting at which this Election Order is adopted was posted on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public at the District's administrative offices for a least seventy-two (72) hours preceding the scheduled time of the meeting; that a telephonic or telegraphic notice of such meeting was given to all news media who have consented to pay any and all expenses incurred by the District in connection with providing such notice, both as required by the Texas Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended; and that such meeting was open to the public as required by law at all times during which this Election Order and the subject matter thereof was discussed, considered and formally acted upon.

Section 13. Mandatory Statement of Information.

(a) Pursuant to Section 3.009, Texas Election Code: (i) the proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 4 of this Election Order, (ii) the purposes for which the bonds are to be authorized are set forth in Section 3 of this Election Order, (iii) the principal amount of bonds to be authorized is set forth in Section 3 of this Election Order, (iv) if the issuance of bonds is authorized by voters, taxes sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements may be imposed, as set forth in Section 3 of this Election Order, (v) bonds authorized pursuant to this Election Order may be issued to mature over a specified number of years not to exceed the lesser of forty (40) years or the maximum number of years authorized by law and bearing interest at the rate or rates (not to exceed 15%), as authorized by law and determined by the Board, (vi) as of the date of the adoption of this Election Order, the aggregate amount of outstanding principal of the District's debt obligations is \$50,734,994.40 and the aggregate amount of outstanding interest on the District's debt obligations is \$14,197,024.10, and (vii) the District's ad valorem debt service tax rate as of the date of adoption of this Election Order is \$0.358817 per \$100 valuation of taxable property.

(b) Based upon market conditions as of the date of this Election Order, the maximum net effective interest rate for any series of the bonds is estimated to be 5.50%. Such estimated maximum interest rate is provided as a matter of information but is not a limitation on the interest rate at which the bonds, or any series thereof, may be sold. In addition, the estimate contained in this subsection (b) is (i) based on certain assumptions (including assumptions concerning prevailing market and economic conditions at the time(s) of issuance of the bonds) and derived from projections obtained from the District's financial advisor, (ii) subject to change to the extent that actual facts, circumstances and conditions prevailing at the time that the bonds are issued differ from such assumptions and projections, (iii) provided solely in satisfaction of the requirements of Section 3.009, Texas Election Code, and for no other purpose, without any assurance that such projections will be realized, and (iv) not intended to and does not give rise to a contract with voters or limit the authority of the Board to issue bonds in accordance with the Propositions submitted by this Election Order.

Section 14. Authority of the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall have the authority to take, or cause to be taken, all reasonable or necessary actions to ensure that the Election is fairly held and returns properly counted and tabulated for canvass by the Board, which actions are hereby ratified and confirmed. Without limiting the generality of the immediately preceding sentence, the Superintendent and his designees are hereby authorized to complete and update, as necessary, the exhibits hereto with the necessary information as same is made available to the District.

Section 15. Authorization to Execute. The President or Vice President of the Board is authorized to execute and the Secretary of the Board is authorized to attest this Election Order on behalf of the Board; and the President or Vice President of the Board is authorized to do all other things legal and necessary in connection with the holding and consummation of the Election.


Section 16. Effective Date. This Election Order is effective immediately upon its passage and approval.

McKey was one of the top performers on the Rams'


defense last season, leading Mayde Creek with 121 tackles while garnering eight tackles for loss and three sacks.
