Screenings important in treating colorectal cancer

March was Colorectal Cance Awareness Month, but for people ages 45 and older, it's always wise--
never mind the month-to get themselves screened, a Katy doctor said "Basically, it's a cancer of the colon or rectum," Dr. Tareq Kamal, a dist West in Katy, said. "It happens on the inside of the colon or the recum. It can grow and spread towards lymph glands and other organs.
The American Cancer Societ The American Cancer society orectal cancer screening when one turns 45 . If one has a family cancer history, screenings should start earlier than that. One might be at one has a family history of this can cer, a personal history of colorectal polyps, inflammatory bowel disease, such as Crohn's and ulcerative coliis, or genetic syndromes, including nomatous Polyposis (FAP).
"Routine screenings can help prevent colorectal cancer or find it at an early stage, when it's smaller and more easily treatable," Kamal said. the cancer fully and achieve better putcomes."
Kamal said about 106,000 new cases of colorectal cancer are diagnosed in the US each year. This agnosed. Kamal said the rate of men getting this cancer is $33 \%$ higher han women.
Kamal is new to Katy-he reloated to Texas last September-but completed his training in colorectal cancer treatment in 2016. He did his residency in Chicago and practiced medicine in Michigan before coming Texas.

The technology has become more available to doctors and they have more experience with them, he said.
"The results of been very positive and comparable to other forms of surgery," Kamal said, adding that one benefit of the technology is that patients tend to have shorter hospita stays. differently from colon cancer. Rectal cancer is more complex, he said, and the patient will undergo an MRI so the medical team can decide the best
options for surgery and treatment. options for surgery and treatment.
While age and family history are beyond a patient's control, it is possible to reduce risk for colorectal cancer by following some basic guidelines.
Kamal said eating a healthy diet, Kamal said eating a healthy diet,
exercising regularly, losing weight, and avoiding tobacco, and limiting or avoiding alcohol can all help lower the risk of colorectal cancer. Such a diet, Kamal said, would involve reducing or avoiding red meat and processed
foods. As for exercise, Kamal said, any form of exercise that lowers one body mass index (BMI) and improves cardiac ability are good.

 Along with Americanbumblebees, the research are focusing on populations of long-horned bees, which are important pollinators of agricultural crops. As the project progresses, the
pollen from the bee samples poill be used to determine floral relationships. "We'll try to figure out which types of plants are
represented on the bees represented on the bees
based on the pollen that based on the pollin tha
they carry", Bennett said. "Maybe there are certain flowers that they need that we don't quite know just yet." Justin Williams, a biological sciences professor at Sam Houston State Universi ty, serves as the botanist for the research project. Using scanning electron
microscopes, Williams and
len grains collected from the bees. Williams said his team has identified about $80 \%$ of the pollen from the bees
trapped during the study's first year. "We are trying to find the diet of these bees,", Williams said, with the goal of intro-
ducing more of the flowers that the bees prefer. Williams said sampling locations and methods will be refined through the study's third year to start bringing all of our data together," Williams said. "Then we'll start working on a modern inventory
of the bees that we have" of the bees that we have.
Williams said he's hoping Williams said he's hoping
to find species of bees that haven't been seen in decades.
"It's not that they've gone

MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 136 AND TO ALL OTHER MUNICIPAL UTILITY
INTERESTED PARTIES:

Pursuant to the Texas Water Code, the Board of Directors (the "Board")
of Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 136 (the "District" has of Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 136 (the "Distric") has
adopted an Order Establishing Rules and Regulations Regarding Sanitary and Pollution Control of the Areas in Proximity to the District's Public Water Supply Well (the "Rules"), a substantive statement and the penalties for violation of which are as follows:
The Rules require the uses and construction of facilities in or on land within one hundred fifty feet ( $150^{\circ}$ ) of the Districts Water Well No. 1 (the
"Well"), located at 18322 Harrow Hill Drive, Houston, Texas 77084, for the purposes of preserving the sanitary condition of water controlled
by the District, to provide and regulate a safe and adequate fresh water by the District, to provide and regulate a safe and adequate fresh water
distribution system, to protect the water supply of the District's Well by means of sanitary control, and to enable the District to comply with all applicable state and local regulations.
The construction, existence, and/or operation of the following activities
within a 150 -foot radius of the Well are prohibited: (a) septic tank o sewage treatment perforated drainfields; areas irrigated by low dosage, low angle spray on-site sewage facilities; absorption beds, evapotranspiration beds; abandoned, inoperative or improperly
constructed water wells of any depth; underground petroleum and chemical storage tanks or liquid transmission pipelines; sewage treatment plants; sewage wet wells; sewage pumping stations; drainage
ditches which contains industrial waste discharges or wastes from sewage ditches which contains industrial waste discharges or wastes from sewage
treatment systems; animal feed lots; solid waste disposal sites, landfill and treatment systems; animal feed lots; solid waste disposal sites, landfili and
dump sites; lands on which sewage plant or septic tank sludge is applied;
lands irrigated by sewage plant effluent; military facilities; industria dump sites; lands on which sewage plant or septic tank suduge is apstria
lands irrigated by sewage plant effuent; military facilities, industrial
facilities: wood-treatment facilities; liquid petroleum and petrochemical facilities; wood-treatment facilities; liquid petroleum and petrochemical
production, storage and transmission facilities; Class $1,2,3$, and production, storage, and transmission facilities; Class $1,2,3$, and 4
injection wells; pesticide storage and mixing facilities, all other constructions or operations that could poliute the groundwater sources
of the Well; and (b) the construction, existence and/or operation of tile of the Welli; and (b) the construction, existence and/or operation of tile
or concrete sanitary sewers, sewer appurtenances, septic tanks, storm sewers, cemeteries, and/or the existence of livestock in pastures is specifically prohibited within a 50 -foot radius of the Well.
Persons found to be in violation of the Rules shall be notified by the District in writing. A person who violates any of the provisions of the
